Last Wednesday night, some villains stop- ped, a Dealing man, near the Market-house, and robbed him of four Guineas and a gold Watch.

Last week, the following uncommonly hor- rid murder was perpetrated at Fuorovore, in the Barony of Glanerouga, County Kerry. Da- niel Sullivan, being in possession of said farm, stocked it with cows, and his brother James Sullivan repeatedly carried them off. At length the latter and younger brother, insisting on building on the farm, Daniel injured him he should not; on which James carried a loaded Blunderbuss and shot his brother dead on the spot; after which he made his escape.
