 MR. GRATTAN said that the ministers of the Crown in a free country, and in a limited monarchy, are impeachable for an improvident war, a disgraceful peace, or a wasteful subsidy; for these are abuses of legal power, though not a violation of law. He contended that the bill did not go to the subversion of government, it only went to an alteration and improvement in the point of practice; and he denied that the bill had for its tendency the ousting of the present administration. He concluded a speech replete with uncommon information, and delivered with all that fire and animation which Mr. Grattan so eminently possesses, with declaring that the bill brought in by his hon. friend, should have his warmest support.

MR. CURRAN in a speech of considerable length, in which he displayed uncommon great abilities, closed the debate, and voted in favour of the bill.
