

mob surrounded the chaise of their King, and would not suffer them to proceed on their journey, Monsieur la Fayette exerted with becoming spirit to procure a free passage for their Majesties, but in vain. They offered his own life, if he persisted; and the King, after sitting in the carriage an hour and three quarters, during which time he was entertained with the eloquence of the King, who told them, that "they were misled by bad advisers, and that in a moment of passion, it was not wise in his Majesty to permit that must inflame the jealousies of the people;" they returned to the Palace of the King, and the multitude, after shouting for the King, were perfectly restored to temper. In consequence of this tumult, the following day the National Assembly on Tuesday at 10 o'clock the President read a letter from the King, stating his design to come to the National Assembly.

The King shortly after entered. The most profound silence took place. Every one rose from his seat by the side of the President. The Officers took their stations beneath, and the King of his suite within the bar.

It was then pronounced, with firmness and authority, the following speech by the King: "Gentlemen, I come into the midst of you, with confidence which I have ever testified. You have been informed of the obstacles which I yesterday experienced in my way to St. Cloud. I would not consent to be repelled by force, from the occasioning acts of severity against a multitude, who thought they were acting in conformity to the laws, at the time they were acting upon them. But it behoves them to prove that I am free: Nothing is so contrary to the authority of the functions and of the prerogatives which I have given to your order, as this potent reason therefore, I permit my intention of going to St. Cloud, of the National Assembly will feel the necessity seems as if, for the purpose of insinuating unfaithful people, whose affection I have endeavoured to inspire them with doubts, and to my sentiments for the constitution, which I have sworn to maintain with all my power, but repeat those sentiments have often manifested to the National Assembly. It knows that my intentions and my views are no other object than the welfare of the Nation; and that welfare can result but from the observance of the laws, and an obedient and legitimate and constitutional authority."

On the 20th day, the department of Paris sent a letter to the King, in which they plainly rebuke the people have taken at his being surrounded by enemies of the Revolution: "The King is full of the nonjuring Bishops, evidently favours them. They confoundly desiring him to discard all those to whom he is attached, for the sake of the people's suspicions; and hinting that, if he does not, this Address will be followed by others from the other departments of the Kingdom."

In consequence of this Address, the Bishop of Sens and Cardinal Montmorency, the two principal men, were actually dismissed in the afternoon. And the next morning, the greatest number of them who were distinguished by the name Aristocrates, and the clergy whom the King had hitherto favoured, were obliged to evacuate the
