KING'S BENCH.

BREACH OF PROMISE OF MARRIAGE.

Yesterday was held before Lord Kenyon, a case brought by Miss Mary Smith against a Taylor, to recover a satisfaction in damages for breach of promise of marriage. The plaintiff appeared by the evidence of several witnesses, that the plaintiff was the daughter of an eminent farmer, but in consequence of his death, she went into service; the defendant paid his addresses to her with the approval of all her friends for about two years; he expressed a great regard for her, and declared his intention to marry her, but fixed no time. In expectation that he would marry her his wife, one of the witnesses advanced a sum of money to go into a shop at Drogheda; and a few days before he left Drogheda, he said, he would come to town in three months and marry the plaintiff; instead of fulfilling his promise, he married another woman with some fortune; upon examination, the witnesses said, that the defendant was about 43 years of age, and the plaintiff about 33. The learned Judge addressed the Jury on behalf of

Brooks, of West Bromwich, for 40 guineas; and although it was set aside by the vigilance of some gentlemen in the neighbourhood, yet a large company assembled, and two battles were fought; the first terminated in one of the combatants being carried to a neighbouring house, where he lay dangerously ill; and the second ended in the death of one Henry Smith, who received from his antagonist a violent blow on the left side, which burst a large artery; he instantly fell, and died.
