This early communication and alarm will enable families to resort to the necessary measures to stop the progress of flames; or, in the worst cases, to provide for the safety of their persons and property.

Yesterday, arrived in this harbour a large gulling wherry, captured on the 17th inst. by the Saltees, by the Dunleary barge, commanded by Mr. Rumley, surveyor. The cargo consisting of wine, spirits, tobacco, and napery to a considerable amount, was safely lodged in the Custom-house stores.
