We hear that a FEMALE CHARITY SCHOOL, under the patronage of the respectable Inhabitants of this City, is to be opened in Newgatelane, on Monday next: The Patrons and Go. vernors, defirous of making this inflitution beneficial as possible, have determined to add, to the cultomary mode of instruction, the knowledge of plain work, knitting, fpinning, &c. to enable poor childen to live partly by their own labour and to qualify them for the different employments affigned them by Providence:-These habits of industry, learned at an early period, will leave impressions not easily removed, and influence their conduct ever after; for, fuch of them as are fo unfortitinate as not to be trained up to bufinels, ere they arrive at the age of fourteen, run the rifque of being ignorant during their lives. The propriety and necefficy of this institution, as well as the advantages that must confequently refult from it, are too obvious to need much explanation: Not only the feelings of a fympathizing heart, but a concern for felf prefervation require a particular attention to the means which may contribute most effectually to render these females useful, inflead of being a burthen and diffrace to fociety, and totally unacquainted with either labour or device, " by which man profreth,"-Having duties to perform in all domestic affairs, they, confequently, have it frequently in their power either to dillutb the peace, or to promore the comfort and lafety of those with whom they live, and so immediately is our duty made to coincide with our interest, that much more real fatisfaction will accrue to a generous mind, from denying itfe f, or retrenching fome unnecoffery expences, to relieve the unfortunate, and refeue helplefs objects from mifery and its concomitant appendages, than would arife from the indulgence of every temporal gratification. It is hoped, with every degree of confidence; that the worthy inhabitants of Limerick and its vicinity (remarkable for their bumane difpolition) will countenance this undertaking, and use their influence in its favour : As the subject is worthy the peculiar confideration of the Ladies, their kind patronage cannot fail accelerating its enablishment,
