O'CALLAGHAN, who died a few days ago, at Spancelhill in the co. Clare, in consequence of a wound he received in a duel, was the lineal descendant of Callaghan Cashell, a heroic Irish hero, who, with his brother, Kennedy, vanquished the Danes in a bloody sea fight, on the coast of this kingdom, in the tenth century. — To most refined manners and accomplishments, he united the most exalted ideas of honour and glory, which will render his memory dear to all those who had the honor of his acquaintance; and what adds to the universal grief, excited by his premature and untimely death, is the extinction of the male line of this noble and illustrious family, as he died without son.

On Friday, 9th inst. at the assizes of Mullingar, James Ryan, alias Supple, alias the Robb, Francis Ryan, Christopher Thompson, William Lawler, and Garret Ryan, were all capitally convicted of robbery, and are to be hanged in a few days.

Friday last, the remains of the late George Quin, Esq; attended by a number of gentlemen in carriages, his numerous tenantry, and others, proceeded from Quinsboro' to Adare, where his corpse was interred in the family vault.

Last Saturday, George Lancy for wilful and corrupt perjury, stood in the pillory for one hour, at the Market-ho, with a label on his breast and back, expressive of his crime.
