honour of the important and glorious event,

credible multitude of citizens of all ranks who at-
tended on the occasion, their acclamations rent
the air. The several corps afterwards went
through the plan of a mock engagement, and
performed several other manœuvres previous to
their return to town about four o'clock in the
evening, and notwithstanding the great con-
course of people who attended, there did not
the slightest accident occur, and joy and hos-
