"On the 12th he had a kind of fit, in which

his breathing difficult, and he remained insen-
sible for half an hour. On the 17th he had
another similar fit. On the 18th he was seized
with hiccapping, which continued on the next
day, when he took some musk draughts by di-
rection of the physician. About seven o'clock
on Wednesday morning, the 20th of January,
he had another fit, and died in about an hour
after. He was perfectly sensible during his ill-
ness, except in the fits, till within a few hours
of his death. This event he all along expected
to take place: and he often said that he had no
other wish for life, than as it gave him the
means of relieving his fellow-creatures."

DUBLIN, January 16.

Thursday next his Excellency the Lord Lieu-
tenant will go in the usual state to the House
of Peers, and open the Session with a speech
from the Throne.

Last Saturday was seized by Mr. John
Chappell, Tide Officer, at the creek of Dunbeg,
in the county of Clare, a small sloop called the

Police in said County; they reached the Castle
at dawn of day on Monday, and in a Cabin
adjacent thereto, apprehended Anthony M^r
Cleary, alias Clarke, and his Son, the former
father to Patrick Clarke, described as one of
the Robbers at Mr. Palmer's;—in the Cabin,
they found a Lady's pinchbeck Watch, Chain
and Seal, (an impression of which has been
left at the shop of the Printers hereof,) a Green
pinchbeck Watch, an Umbrella, a pair of Sil-
ver Buckles, Stock Buckle and Tea Spoon:—
The above articles are now in the possession of
the High Constable;—Clarke and his Son were
yesterday brought in by Mr. Fall, and com-
mitted to the City Jail.

It has been this day discovered that the
above articles were stolen out of Mr. Holland's
house at Crossagallow.
