of Leogane, and the Captain had no doubt but they would be able to preserve the plantations.

An embargo had been laid on all the shipping at Port au Prince, in consequence of this unfortunate event, both with a view to secure the assistance of the crews in case of necessity, and that the vessels might serve to accommodate the inhabitants who had been burnt out of their houses. But the Captain of the vessel who brought the news, cut his cable and stood out to sea, though he was fired at with shot from the port.

It is so far fortunate that this fire happened at a season of the year when there could not be any considerable quantity of produce in the warehouses; and as the inhabitants are said to have shipped off all they could, when the dispute between the People of Colour and the Whites ran so high as to threaten an attack upon the town in September and October last, the loss of produce must be inconsiderable. It is not said how long the fire continued; but it is to be hoped, as nothing is mentioned to the contrary, that no lives are lost, and that the Merchants saved their books and papers.

Four ships of war, with a reinforcement of troops, sailed from Martinique for St. Domingo about the 9th or 10th of November, and two frigates from Brest about the same time with a regiment for the same destination; and further reinforcements have gone from different ports since, to the number, in all, as it is said, of about 8 or 9000 men, besides several ships of war. It is to be hoped, that such a force will restore order and preserve that superb Colony."

By sundry gentlemen who are arrived in town since Thursday last, we have the melancholy account of the defeat of the army under General St. Clair. They say the attack was made by the Indians, on the 4th inst. at day break, and continued four hours. That we lost 44 commissioned officers, killed, and 27 wounded, and about 600 privates, beside pack horse and bullock drivers, &c. 8 pieces of cannon, and all the baggage.

LONDON, January 17, 18, 19 & 20.

The new regulation which his Majesty has been pleased to make for the pay of the soldiery in Great Britain, has been mentioned in the papers, but in none has it been correctly stated. It is as follows:

Poundage,	—	—	£ 0 12 0
Allowance for bread,	—	—	2 5 6
Ditto for necessaries,	—	—	0 16 1 1/2

With the subsistence, it renders the soldiers whole pay about 12l. 17s. per annum.

The poundage is an old allowance. No part of the augmentation extends to the troops employed in the Colonies, or those on the Irish establishment.

It is reported at Paris, that a loan of several millions for Russia and Sweden was lately opened at Amsterdam; that the monied men said if an assurance were given them that the money was not to be employed for the purpose of making war on France, the subscription would be filled in a day; but that as this assurance could not be given, not a single subscriber was found.

A young Nobleman has paid the enormous sum of 30,000l.!!! won from him at play—as a Gentleman in Pall Mall can testify!

According to letters from the Hague the news received from the East Indies is distressing. The Dutch Company is engaged in an open war with the King of Candia, who has taken a ship of 54 guns, part of the crew of which he massacred, and confined the rest in dungeons. He is actually at the head of an army of 28,000 men, to oppose which the Company has barely 1000.

By the arrival of the George, Dalrymple, at Lancaster, which was on Tuesday announced at Lloyd's, dispatches have been received at the Secretary of State's Office from Jamaica. Lord Effingham mentions, that the troops were in tolerable health, that several recruits had joined their respective regiments; that the plantations had been uncommonly productive in commodities for home-consumption; and that the misfortunes of St. Domingo had opened sources of temporary emoluments, by the sale of sugars to the French merchants and others on the Continent.

Extract of a letter from New Haven, Nov. 28.

"I have just received information from the Eastward, that the town of Port-au-Prince was destroyed by fire on or about the 7th of this month. I hope the account is not true; but I have no reason to doubt it."

Tuesday last died, at his house in Queen-square, Bath, the Right Rev. George Horne, D. D. Lord Bishop of Norwich, and formerly Dean of Canterbury. His health has been decaying for some time past, and a stroke of apoplexy, which happened a few weeks ago, totally deprived his friends of the hopes they had entertained. Dr. Horne owed his promotion, in part, to the able vindications he published of the established religion. He preserved to the last his mental faculties; they have done honour to his country, and his works in the cause of religion will be remembered, when his adversaries, bewildered in the darkness of infidelity, can grope no longer.

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
