It appears to this Meeting, that there are at present  
in this House 70 Men and 83 Women, of which 9 of  
the former and 21 of the latter are Lunatics, and that  
there are frequent Applications to be admitted, which  
are likely to continue for some time; that the entire  
Sum in the Hands of the Treasurer, for the support of  
the House, amounts to 33l. 3s. 1d. of which 30l. is due  
on account of the Charity, and that there is no hope of  
any further aid arising from Presentments of County or  
City, until after next Summer Assizes; as the only  
means therefore of supporting this Charity,

RESOLVED, That the Treasurer make Application to  
the LORD BISHOP of LIMERICK, to request he will  
order CHARITY SERMONS to be preached, pursuant  
to the Act of Parliament, for the Benefit of said Charity;  
and that the Rev. Doctor CONWAY be requested to  
recommend to his Clergy, and those of his Persuasion,  
to contribute their aid also, in such manner as shall be  
most effectual.

RESOLVED, That the unanimous Thanks of the  
Governors and Governesses of this House be returned to  
JOHN PRENDERGAST SMYTH, Esq; for his very  
great attention to this useful Charity, and for his libe-  
rality in sending Cloathing for the numerous Objects  
therein.—Ordered that the above Resolutions be
