The presidency of Fort St. George, as early

These orders, and the different arrangements
adopted in consequence, were executed with a

tion; in consequence of which, his Lordship,
by the return of fair weather, found himself
enabled to take the field with an army in high
spirits, and plentifully supplied with every ne-
cessary.
The intelligence respecting Tippoo's situation
is, that he was at, or near his capital, but in
extreme distress for want of provisions, having
laid his country waste for a considerable extent
to prevent the approach of our army.

Mr. THIGHE presented the thirteenth re-
port of the commissioners of account. Or-

suant to order, an account of the exports and
imports of this kingdom, ending the 25th
March, 1791; also an account of the quan-
tity of raw and thrown silk; and likewise the
quantity of cotton, wool and yarn imported in
the years ending the 25th March, 1785, and
the 25th March, 1791, distinguishing the coun-
tries whence imported. Ordered to lie on the
table.
Mr. PAKENHAM presented an account of
the particulars of incidents of the Ordnance.
Sir EDWARD CROFTON presented a peti-
tion from the proprietors of the Arigna iron-
works, praying aid; which was referred to a
committee.
Lord DELVIN moved several resolutions
relative to the trials of controverted elections
or returns of Members to serve in Parliament;
which were agreed to by the House.
Mr. JOCELYN presented a list of the pen-
sions on the civil establishment on the 20th of
January, 1792. Ordered to lie on the table.

that the Speaker do issue his warrant to the
Clerk of the Crown, to make out a new writ
for electing a burghers to serve in this present
Parliament for the Borough of Belfast, in the
room of the Hon. Joseph Hewitt, now one of
the Judges of his Majesty's Court of King's
Bench. A new writ was also ordered for
