Gentlemen.

Mr. OGLE ftill preffed for the postponing of the bill. He faid this bill was but read the first time on Saturday last, and he asked was it possible, fince that time, for the Protestant gentlemen throughout the kingdom, to affemble and confider the tendency and extent of the bill, and to inftruct their Representatives how they should vote on a question of such magnitude?
