give his vote, and that on Monday he found
had voted contrary to the sense of his constitu-
ents, he should feel himself in an awkward
tuation; he observed that there never was
bill of greater importance before the House
than the present, and the postponing the second
reading of it till Wednesday could not possibly
impede its progress.

Mr. Ogle seconded the motion of the Hon. Gentleman, and he hoped that the Hon. Gentleman who had introduced the bill would express its second reading this night, but that he would agree to postpone it, in order to accommodate the Protestants of Ireland, and to give the members of this House an opportunity to know what the sentiments of the Protestants throughout the kingdom are, he said he was informed, that the county which he had the honour to represent was to have met this day, and as he had not received the instructions of his constituents on the subject of the bill, he hoped that the second reading of it would be postponed.

Sir HERCULES LANGRISHE considered himself as bound by the rules and forms of Parliament, not to agree to postpone the second reading of the bill; he said when he first brought forward this business, he had stated to the House the propositions which he intended to introduce into the bill, and the Committee who were appointed to propose it, had not deviated in the smallest instance from the propositions which had been stated; that if he had not guarded against every circumstance, and if there had been an article of deviation from the propositions which he had stated, that might be a ground for gentlemen wishing to postpone the bill; but every opportunity had been given to have the sense of the kingdom on the subject, before the bill was to be committed, and whether the bill be read a second time this day, or on Wednesday; the Right Hon. Gentleman who spoke last, and the Hon. Gentleman who made the motion, may debate the principle of the bill before going into the Committee, by voting against the Speaker's leaving the Chair; he was extremely concerned to find that there were objections to the principle of the bill, and as the sense of the whole nation on this subject would be known before this day fennight, he was sorry he could not agree to the motion of the Hon. Gentlemen.

Mr. OGLE still pressed for the postponing of the bill. He said this bill was but read the first time on Saturday last, and he asked was it possible, since that time, for the Protestant gentlemen throughout the kingdom, to assemble and consider the tendency and extent of the bill, and to instruct their Representatives how they should vote on a question of such magnitude? For his part, he wished to know the sense of his constituents on the subject; as to his sentiments, he was decidedly against the principle of the bill.

Mr. CURR hoped, for the dignity of the House, and the credit of the nation, that the bill would be read a second time this night.—The Right Hon. Gentleman may debate on its being committed. He had read the bill with some degree of attention, and he could not see in it an error that militated against the Protestant ascendancy in this country; if there was, he would be one of the first to vote against it. He said, whatever we give to the Roman Catholics, let us give it with honour and liberality, and he was sure that they will be grateful for whatever benefits are extended to them.

Mr. MAXWELL expressed his wish that the bill should be read a second time on Wednesday, that time might be given to the counties to instruct their representatives against it. He

They used him in a manner too shocking to relate, and would have put an end to his existence but for the fortunate, tho' accidental, arrival of Mr. Butler, of Bunahow, who rescued him from those incensed people and had him conveyed to his own house, where he experienced every attention that could be rendered to alleviate his wretched condition.

Early yesterday morning Mr. Dowling, with much humanity, took a party of the military from Clare Castle, and proceeded to Bunahow, from whence he conveyed the above unfortunate wretch to our Infirmary, where he exhibits a most deplorable spectacle of savage ferocity, having one of his ears, with a part of his cheek cut off, his head shockingly battered, and his body and limbs lacerated all over.
