

will be a sufficient sum in the Treasury to secure the public credit against contingencies, namely, that which had hitherto been issued as the drawback on spirits, which drawback was now withheld.

House sat in committee on several of the money bills, &c. read a second time the Popery Bill, which was committed for Saturday.

Sir T. OSBORNE gave notice that he would move on Saturday for the introduction of a clause into the bill to exonerate Catholics from some oppressive restrictions they labour under from an act of Charles II.

Lord DELVIN observed, that an order had been made by the House directing the usual fees to be paid to the officers of the House, on a bill passed last Session in favour of the Grand Canal Company, which order was not only not complied with, but the Secretary of the Company, had written to the Clerk and expressly refused paying those fees—As he supposed this could have been done only thro' ignorance that such order had been made, he should only say that if the fees were not paid before this day e'night he should move some resolutions to enforce obedience to the order of the House, and to shew that no corporation, however respectable, should treat that order with disrespect.

The CHANCELLOR of the EXCHEQUER moved, that the proper officer do lay before the House an account of the quantity of Ale and Beer brewed in the City of Dublin for nine months, ending 25th December 1790, and a similar one for nine months ending 25th December 1791—Ordered and immediately presented by the Right Hon. Mr. Beresford.

Mr. BROWNE said that among the accounts of sums issued on King's Letters there was a sum of 12,000^l. under the head of "Barracks," part of which was 3628^l. paid for outstanding orders of the Commissioners of Barracks—he thought it necessary that the particulars of that account should be laid before the House. He wished to have explained why the sum of 10^l. for cloathing the Battle-ax Guards was twice charged in the accounts of the last year instead of once, as was usual in former years. He concluded by moving that the proper officer lay before the House an account of the outstanding orders of the Commissioners of Barracks which had been paid from the Treasury by King's-letter.

The CHAN. of the EXCHEQUER said, that though these enquiries came at a time when enquiry usually ceased, after the Committee of accounts had been kept open for ten days, yet he wished not to appear mysterious in any instance, he had no objection to the accounts being ordered however troublesome it might be to the clerks of the Hon. Gentleman at the head of the War Department; he had no objection but the payments would be found entirely consonant to the usual practice. The Chancellor having sat down.

Mr. BROWNE asked whether the Right Hon. Gentleman would not condescend to answer his enquiries relative to the double charge for cloathing of the Battle-ax Guard.

The CHANCELLOR said, he would answer what he should have enquired into it; he might, without any imputation of gross ignorance, be prepared to answer interrogatories relative to the King's bills.

Mr. BROWNE said he now brought it forward as a direct charge that 750^l. more than

Cork, Feb. 13. Arrived at Kinfale, the ship Canton, Capt.
