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Mr. EGAN ably supported the bill.  
Mr. GRATTAN and Mr. CURRAN was  
decidedly for going into a Committee; they  
reprobated the conduct of Government in a  
very forcible manner—in the first instance the  
present Viceroy was pleased to reject a most  
moderate and modest petition from the Roman  
Catholics of Cork; their next step was to  
create a division among the Catholics them-  
selves, and then hold them up as a Body for-  
midable to the English government, and to  
their Protestant fellow subjects.  
Mr. M. Beresford, Mr. F. Hutchinson, and  
C. of the Exchequer supported the bill, as did  
Mr. Barrington, who closed the debate.

The House then resolved itself into a Com-  
mittee on the bill, Lord Delvin in the chair.  
Mr. G. PONSOMBY and Mr. Ogle expres-  
sed a wish that the farther consideration of the  
bill should be postponed to Monday.  
Mr. Sec. HOBART said there was no inten-  
tion to precipitate the business, and in compli-  
ance with the wishes of gentlemen, he had no  
objection to the Chairman reporting progress.  
—On the House being resumed,—Lord Delvin  
reported progress, and got leave to sit again on  
Monday.—At half past twelve o'clock, the  
House adjourned to Monday.

The public have been repeatedly informed  
that Spain was about to make complete repara-  
tion for the Nootka Sound captures. How must  
they be surprised then, when informed that the  
merchants have not yet received one farthing  
of their claims—that many of the captured peo-  
ple died from the brutal treatment they experi-  
enced from the Spaniards, and that at this  
moment upwards of fifty Englishmen, to which  
miserable list may be added nearly the same  
number of Chinese, continue in confinement  
perhaps the most oppressive!—confinement in  
the mines of Mexico and Peru.

Col. Sinclair, who has lately been in London  
on the business of the Emigrant Princes, im-  
mediately on his arrival at Ostend, was put un-  
der an arrest by order of General Bender. The  
charge against him was his having enlisted some  
of the subjects of his Imperial Majesty in the  
month of October last for his regiment of Chas-  
seurs.

An express was immediately sent off by Col.  
S—— to the Princes and M. Calonne, in-  
forming them of this event which, as far as  
first appearances are to be trusted, speaks more  
decisively of the sentiments of the Emperor  
than any thing which has yet occurred.

Capt. Pierce of the Regiment of Ber, was  
also put under an arrest, and on the same ac-  
count.

**COUNTRY NEWS.**

Cork, Feb. 18. Yesterday the 8th Regiment  
arrived at Cove, and landed; and this day  
they marched into Cork.

On the night of Thursday the 9th instant, a  
great number of White Boys, mounted and  
well armed, came to the house of Daniel Cal-  
laghan, a blacksmith, at Steelane, a mile to the  
west of the Ovens, broke open his door, dragged  
the poor man out of his bed, struck him sever-  
al blows with the buttends of their muskets,  
and gave him several cuts and bruises on the  
head—having horsewhipped him, they fired  
two charges of powder at his back, which left  
a sore impression—then they set his shirt on fire  
with a candle, and placed him between two  
ranks, so that he could not advance or retire  
without getting on the points of their swords  
and bayonets. Thus tortured, until the entire  
shirt was consumed, he was left roasted and  
miserable victim. Having made him pass  
through this fiery ordeal, they then took him  
and rolled him in the gutter, by way of cool-  
ing.

A letter from London, says, "the mob of  
Marseilles have torn down the arms of Spain  
from the Townhouse, and suspended them on  
the pillory."

Mr. Daly, the manager of the Dublin thea-  
tre, who was committed to prison a few weeks  
ago, for a twelvemonth, has been released by  
the interference of the Lord Lieutenant.

The Kite Cutter, of 10 guns, commanded  
by Lieut. Lamb, arrived at Foynes-Island,  
last Friday; she is to be stationed in this bar-  
bour for two years, for the prevention of  
smuggling.

On Monday last died in the House of Indus-  
try, at the advanced age of 98 years, Thomas  
Gaff,—his man had been in the House since  
its first establishment, and until within a week  
of his death continued in a state of uninterrup-  
ted health.

brought nothing interesting.
