HOUSE OF LORDS.

MONDAY, Feb. 20.

Lord Viscount PERY presented a petition in several merchants and traders in the city of Limerick, complaining of the illegal demands of toll-gatherers in that city, which retarded the progress of their corn trade, and praying such redress as the House would think to grant. His Lordship supported the petition by a representation of the bad consequences which resulted from these illegal practices, and insisted emphatically upon the respectability of the petitioners.

The LD. CHANCELLOR thought the House should not entertain the petition, compatible with the dignity and justice of Parliament. It was, in his mind, to affect private property, the inviolability of which he hoped that the House would ever pay a scrupulous regard:—his determination upon the merits of the petition might also bear upon the decision of a Court of Law, where, he understood, a profession was commenced relative to the subject in question.—He said it was with great reluctance he refused any petition of the subject; it was with reluctance he opposed the Noble Lord who introduced it; the Noble Lord had represented the petitioners to be most respectable gentlemen; he could give the House the same assurance—but the respectability of the petitioners could not justify Parliament in an interference of private property. Let the right of the Corporation to have tolls be first examined into; let their extent and nature be defined; if any collector of tolls exacts them unlawfully, the Court of King's Bench or Common Pleas are fully competent, without the interference of Parliament, to give relief; but unless the Lordships proceeded by a previous examination of the Corporation's right to tolls, he considered it impossible for them to form any resolution (much more to come to any resolution which he presumed was intended) on the legal or illegality of their collection.—His Lordship said, sensible of the attention which each House of Parliament ought to pay to every petition of the people, if the Noble Viscount would have said that this petition was not to be the subject of any consequent resolution, he would have given his objections to its acceptance; otherwise, as private property was concerned, he would not give his assent to receive it, unless
