

miles, and refused retreating at the beginning of the attack, which he might have accomplished with inconsiderable loss.

Yesterday a meeting of the Merchants and Traders of this city was held at the Royal Exchange, to consider "what measures should be taken, in consequence of an application to the Postmasters General, for dispatching the Inland Mail at an earlier hour than now established."

A Chairman having been appointed, it was moved by a most respectable merchant, That the meeting should adjourn for a week, in order to give the Merchants and Traders at large time to be acquainted with the nature of the alteration proposed.

This motion was strenuously opposed by one or two gentlemen, who insisted on an immediate determination of the question—which being put, a division took place, when there appeared, for adjourning 25, against adjourning 26—majority ONE.

In consequence of this premature determination of a few, an Aggregate Meeting is, we understand, to be called in a few days, when the utility of changing the hour for dispatching the Mails will be of course brought forward, and be either established or rejected on a fair hearing.

As this question materially concerns not only the whole of the Merchants, Traders, and Manufacturers of Dublin, but those of the Nation at large, we shall lay before the Public a candid report of the proceedings of the intended Aggregate Meeting; and we recommend it strongly to our fellow citizens not to bind themselves to any particular measure, until they have heard the arguments to be offered on both sides of the question.

Ordered, That leave be given to bring in a bill for regulating the Elections of Members to serve in Parliament, and for repealing the several laws therein to be mentioned; and that Mr. Denis Bowes Daly, the Honourable Mr. Stewart and Sir Edward Crofton, Baronet, do prepare and bring in the same.

Ordered, that the Committee of the whole house, to whom it was referred to take into consideration a bill for continuing and amending the several laws relating to his Majesty's

grants, pursuant to order, brought in a bill to prevent the excessive price of coals in the city of Dublin; and for other purposes, which was read a first time, and ordered to be read a second time on Thursday.

Capt. Pakenham brought in, according to order, a bill to encourage seamen and marines employed in the royal navy, by rendering it easy to remit their wages to this kingdom, and also by providing in this country for the payment due for wages, which was read a first time, and ordered to be read a second time on Thursday.

The Royal Mining Company bill was read a second time and committed for Thursday.

The inland navigation bill,—the revenue bill,—the regulations for encouraging breweries,—and the regulation of spirit licenses, were all ordered to be taken into consideration on Friday.
