

contracted by a laborious and indefatigable attention to public business, prevented the Marquis of Buckingham from returning to the government of this country. It was not the idle and ill-founded consideration that his government would not have a decided support and strength. The Hon. Gentleman has allowed that the Marquis of Buckingham had recovered his support in Parliament; therefore he contradicts himself.—But however Gentlemen may disagree in some points of that Administration, every act of which he uniformly approved of and supported;—he was confident there was one act of the Marquis of Buckingham's universally approved of, the bringing forward into a high public situation the talents, the liberality, and the conciliatory mind possessed by the Right Hon. Gentleman who represents government in this House.

With respect to the question, founded on the charge of corruption, he was sure the people would not be led away by the opinion of one side, or the passionate declaration of the other side of the House. They would consult their own understanding, and reflect that economy, and not corruption, must be the genuine feature, and the principle of Lord Westmorland's Administration, otherwise public credit, the true barometer to judge by, would not be at this hour so much higher than ever was known in Ireland. He therefore considered the Administration of Lord Westmorland to deserve praise, and not obloquy.

The motion was warmly supported by Mr. Grattan, Mr. Egan, and Mr. Hardy.

On the question being put, the motion was negatived without a division.

At a quarter past two o'clock this morning (Wednesday) the House adjourned.

WEDNESDAY, March 7.  
Att. Gen. presented the report of the Committee appointed to examine into the cause of the late fire, by which the interior part of the House had been consumed.—The substance of the report was, that the fire was entirely owing to an accidental cause.

House sat in Committee on the bill for regulating the office of Constable.

Mr. G. Ogle opposed the bill, because that in the country he had the honour to represent, there existed a respectable magistracy by whom the peace of the country was very well preserved—the bill, then, which in effect was founded on supposed deficiency in this instance, was, with respect to that county, unnecessary—he should therefore move that the county Wexford be excepted in the bill.

Prime Ser. was also adverse to the bill as it went to grant a premium to constables, &c. on the committal of persons to the gaols of the respective counties—it was a fact well known that in the remote parts of the country scarcely one magistrate in ten knew the difference between a bailable offence and one not bailable; and it often happened that men were committed to stand their trial for offences in their nature so trivial that the Judge very often on the conviction of such persons, fined them only 6d. and discharged them; yet for the confinement and conviction of every such person, the county was put to the expence of 30l. sterling. The bill he thought would tend to increase the number of such committals, and therefore he opposed it.

Mr. Smyth opposed the bill, as giving a power to the grand jury to levy a sum of 80l. on each barony. He was certain that his county had no occasion for any such law.
