their head, declared that no degree of a... quity could give sanction to a usage bad in... self, and therefore that general warrants were illegal and void.

"The Solicitor General, my Lord, will inform you, if you apply for his opinion, that the King's proclamation is not a legal authority for the apprehending of any man, against whom no specific charge has been exhibited; for he well knows it is not a warrant under which any private person or public officer could justify, in a court of law, on an action for false imprisonment, unless the party proclaimed had been charged with treason or with felony, or had escaped after the execution of a legal warrant. The Solicitor General, my Lord, will tell you, or if he does not, Lord Chief Justice Coke will, and perhaps he is as good an opinion that the King cannot, by his proclamation change, any part of the common law, statutes or customs of this realm; nor can he, by his proclamation create any offence which was not an offence before; for these things cannot be done without a legislative power, of which, in our Constitution, the King is but a part.

"Here let me take the liberty of suggesting a few queries, which your Excellency may put to Mr. Solicitor General; they naturally result from the doctrine of Lord Coke, and are strictly applicable to the subject of the complaint I lay before your Excellency.

"First, Is a vote of the House of Commons a legislative power?

"Secondly, If a vote of the House of Commons be not a legislative power, is the proclamation issued by your Excellency, and founded solely on that vote, a legal authority for arresting and committing to jail?

"Thirdly, If Lord Coke be right, would not any person apprehended on such proclamation be justifiable in preferring an indictment to a Grand Jury for an assault against the person apprehending him, or in bringing an action against such person for an assault and false imprisonment? The question was tried in a Sister Kingdom, and the messengers of the House of Commons convicted of an assault by an honest Jury, and condemned in fine and imprisonment by an upright Judge, for a violation of the laws.

"Fourthly, As the King is but a part of the constitution, is not the Commons but a part? and have the Commons, as a part greater authority in cases of personal arrest, than the King, who is the Executive Power?

"It is certain, may it please your Excellency, and an object worthy of attention, that in the thirty-first year of Henry the Eighth, it was enacted, that the King's proclamation should have the same effect as an act of Parliament—but not to prejudice life or liberty; on which act Blackstone observes, "This was a statute calculated to introduce the most despotic tyranny, and which must have proved fatal to the liberties of this kingdom, had it not been luckily repealed in the minority of his successor, about five years after.

"And now, my Lord, with the respect which I owe to your Excellency's high station, I submit my complaint to your consideration, not doubting but the Solicitor General, should you think it necessary to resort to his opinion, will advise in a manner truly consistent with the public spirit, disinterestedness, and true patriotism, with which, for a series of years, his great legal knowledge and constitutional principles have uniformly supported the administration of succeeding Lord Lieutenants."
