**ENGLAND.**

Dover, March 18. By some passengers landed this day from the West Indies, we are well informed, that our Colonies there are in perfect harmony, and in a very flourishing condition.

An account is just brought from Calais, that Monsieur, the French King's Brother, is dead, and that the Queen of France is very ill.

**LONDON, MARCH 19.**

The silence of the French Newspapers, we are happy to interpret into a contradiction of those dreadful reports which were circulated by private letters last week.

The Court of France went into mourning, on Tuesday last, for two months, upon occasion of the Emperor's death.

The following is the official account published at Vienna of the progress of the late Emperor's illness.

Feb. 28 His Majesty the Emperor was this day attacked with a rheumatic fever, and an oppression in the chest; the violence of the disorder was considerably removed by bleedings and other necessary remedies.

Feb. 29. the fever increased. His Majesty was bled thrice in the course of the day, which afforded some relief; but the following night was passed in so unquiet a manner, as to reduce his strength very much.

March 1st. The Emperor began to vomit with violent agitation, and brought up every thing he took; at half past three he was choked in vomiting and expired in the presence of her Imperial Majesty.

**HOUSE OF LORDS.**

TUESDAY, March 20.

A petition was presented from certain Journeymen of the City of Dublin, praying to be heard by council against the bill for preventing combination.

Also a petition from the master carpenters, in opposition to that of the journeymen, and praying to be heard by council in favour of the bill.

The petition were read by the clerk, and the House having resolved into a committee of the whole House to take the bill into consideration, the petitions, which had been referred to the committee were read a second time.

Council were heard on both sides—for the masters, Mr. Recorder—for the journeymen, Counsellors G. J. Browne and Cahill.

The clause objected to by the Council for the journeymen was that which made it necessary for every journeyman on leaving an employer, to obtain from him a certificate that he left such employer with his consent, before any other person could employ him, without incurring a penalty of 50l.

to bridewell, and sentence him to be publicly whipt, excited his Lordship's very warm reprobation—he stated in very strong colours the mischief of sending a child for an act of puerile folly to a prison, where his morals must be destroyed, and of sentencing him to be publicly whipt, by which he would infallibly lose all sense of shame and regard for character.

The bill he said should have been entitled a bill for the encouragement of highway robbery and emigration instead of a bill to prevent combination—for, the immediate effect of making men outcasts of society and depriving them of the means of procuring support by labour must be that they will become depredators on the public. He hoped that a bill of this tendency their Lordships would not hesitate instantly to reject—he therefore moved that the chairman should leave the chair.

Archbishop of Cashel warmly supported the bill.—The question being put that the Chairman leave the chair, it was carried without a division—Adjourned till to-morrow.
