St. Patrick's Day, which is observed in London with a spirit of enjoyment similar to what we have at home, differs in one essential particular, which we would wish imitated here, the collection for the poor. As the Assizes. SATURDAY, March 24. The Court sat at a quarter before eight o'clock notwithstanding it being so early the Court was uncommonly crowded. The Jury were sworn (which was a remarkable one,) Rose Dillon and Edward Quirk (who were arraigned the day before) were given in charge on two indictments.

Dillon, stood indicted on the first indictment for petty treason, for having poisoned his husband, Michael Dillon, of Ballyquinn; by giving him a certain poison containing arsenick, prepared with whey, of which he drank on the 28th of September last, and which he lived till the 1st of October, and which, contrary to the statute, &c. and Edward Quirk stands indicted as principal in the second indictment, the said Rose Dillon stood indicted for petty treason, for having administered poison to her husband, of which he died; and Edward Quirk stood indicted for having aided and abetted her in

as respected the said Michael Dillon, one of them swore to a conversation between her and Mrs. Dillon, which took place on the Sunday preceding Mr. Dillon's death, and when he was ill in bed, in which Mrs. Dillon expressed her apprehensions that Mr. Dillon would not recover from his illness.

On the part of the prisoners, Doctor Patrick Maguire, who was present at the dissection of the body, and Surgeon Patrick Dillon, who opened the body of the deceased, were produced, and they proved, in the clearest manner, that they could not trace the smallest appearance of any poison having been administered to the deceased; and Doctor Maguire, who was called in to attend the deceased before his death, swore, that he found him labouring under an acute bilious fever, the consequence of a Cholera Morbis, and in his opinion it was of that disorder the deceased died. Surgeon Dillon was exceedingly clear, and evinced great professional knowledge in the course of his examination; and he said, that from the examination of the body he would take upon him positively to swear, that the deceased did not die of poison.

On the cross examination of these last witnesses they admitted, that they were never present at the dissection of a body which had been poisoned.

The evidence being gone through, the Judge charged the Jury, and they, without quitting the box, brought in their verdict—Not Guilty.

A Correspondent observes, that, as every article has risen to almost double the price it was forty years ago, especially potatoe ground, which at that time let for thirty or forty shillings per acre, should not some mode be struck out (and Magistrates may do it at their Quarter Sessions) to increase the poor man's hire? In most parts of this country he is still obliged to work from six to six for five pence; the highest he is allowed is sixpence halfpenny a day, and we all know that he must now pay from four to eight pounds an acre for his potatoe ground:—By an increase of hire he'd be enabled to send his children to school, which in time would render them more civilized, nor should we see our fellow-creatures, the workmanship of the same God, as we now-a-days see them, with scarcely the rags of wretchedness to cover them.

It reflects great credit on the persevering conduct of Mr. Philip Russell, that the office of a Market Juror is now become almost unnecessary; since he has been appointed Clerk of the Market, very little blown meat is to be seen in the markets;—and the removal of nuisances, and cleanliness of the streets, shew how necessary it was to appoint an active person Inspector of the Roads for this city and liberties.
