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declare war against the King of Hungary, whom they consider only tampering to watch the most favourable opportunity of overturning the objects of the French Revolution.

It is believed that the Dukes of Gloucester and Argyle will resign the command of their respective regiments of Guards, and that the whole three will then be given to the Duke of York.

On Tuesday night (and not before) died, aged 87, Sir George Pococke, K. B. and one of the elder Brethren of the Trinity House.—He began his Profession in the Navy under his uncle Sir George Byng, who was afterwards the first Lord Torrington. In 1718 he served on board the fleet in that memorable victory off Scilly. He then went through the different ranks of his profession with distinguished assiduity. In 1758, he commanded as Admiral in Chief, the British fleet in India, where, with an inferior force, he gained three conspicuous victories over the French fleet. On his return to Europe he was appointed Commander in Chief of the naval force against the Havannah, in the taking of which he displayed remarkable proofs of science and of valour.

### British Parliamentary Intelligence. HOUSE OF COMMONS. THURSDAY, April 5.

Mr. Hippisley, after making some observations on the recent accounts from India; and on a promise, which he said the Minister for Affairs in that quarter had made, that he would, from time to time, lay the accounts received from India immediately before the public, moved, "That Copies of the latest Intelligence received from India, by Ministers, or by the Company, respecting the War in India, be laid before the House."

Mr. Secretary Dundas denied that he had ever made such a promise as that imputed to him by the Hon. Gentleman, it would be a dereliction from his duty, and absurd and ridiculous in the highest degree. The impropriety of such a conduct was too obvious to be mentioned; it was in the discretion of Ministers what accounts were fit to be published, or withheld; with respect to the present Motion, he must resist it, as one of the most evil tendency.

Mr. Hippisley maintained, that the promise had been made. With respect to publishing accounts, he said, that it was pretty notorious that letters had been lately received from different parts of India, stating certain hostile operations; that they had even been published in the daily prints, and had influenced the Funds. It was also notorious by these accounts, that the Commercial Treaty with France had been broken in India, in the instance of forcibly searching a French vessel. These were circumstances of which some account ought to be published by Gentlemen opposite to him, and which would, in that case, have rendered his present motion unnecessary.

Mr. Secretary Dundas with some warmth replied, that he was of opinion, that if the Hon. Gentleman had previously consulted with any person of a rational or sober understanding, or even with any of his friends, that he would have been deterred from bringing forward such intemperate and improper Motions as he was in the habit of doing.

Mr. Hippisley replied, that the Motion was the result of cool reflection on the subject, and also with the advices of friends; but as he saw
