TRIAL of DR. PRIESTLEY's Caufe! On Thursday morning the Court at Warwick was crowded at an early period, to hear the trial of Dr. Prieftley's canfe, His principal evidences for his furniture and wearing apparel were his two fons and daughter-for his philofophic apparatus, the Rev. Mr. Johnson, the Rev. Ar. Berrington (the Catholic) Mr. Galton, and Mr. Nairne the optician-for the va-Ine of his books, old Mr. Paine, whose comical way of giving in his evidence kept the Court in a continued laughter-and for his manuscrints, Mr. Johnson' of Sr. Paul's Church-yard. The claim for these latter was 4201, 155. Among them were memoirs of his own life, and diaries

regularly kept by him fince the year 1752. Mr. George Hardinge, who led the defence for the Hundred, was very fevere upon the Doctor. He quoted from his different works fuch passages as he deemed hostile to our King and prefent constitution-he particularly noticed his being an admirer of the new Gallie conftitution. He offered it as his opinion that the familiar writings of the Doctor to the people of Birmingham, had been one of the principal causes that irritated the minds of the populace in that place. The Chief Baron, in his charge to the Jury, observed, that as the Counsel had not been at the pains legally to prove in the Court that the writings from which he read extracts were in the Doctor's works, if they were not, fuch was the nature of them, that he might be faid to have been guilty of atrocious calumny.

His Lordship observed to the Jury, that the' a bookfeller could prove that certain books were to him, and to the author, of fuch a value, (by the fale they would have) yet if they were of an immoral tendency, or contained principles which tended to overturn our present constitution, no Jury would be jullified in allowing any thing for such manuscripts. Among the writings, however, for which damages were now claimed, he observed the majority were not of a political tendency, -In about nine hours after the beginning of the trial, the Jury returned their verdict for 25021, 18, being 16191, 131.91. less than Dr. Prieftley's claim (41221- 115. 91)

The Doctor was not in Court, but at a friend's house opposite the Hall.

After Doctor P's, the next cause was young Hutton's, for wearing apparel, library, &c. dettroyed in his father's house. The Jury gave him 6251, the whole of his claim,
