## DUBLIN, April 16.

This day, about two o'clock in the afternoon, Mr. Tandy, who was at his fon's door in Chancery-lane, just stepping with Mr. Badham Thornhill into his carriage, was arrested on the late proclamation by a man, who shewed him the Gazette, and required him to follow him. Mr. Tandy obeyed, and was, in confequence, conducted to the Exhibition-House in-William ftreet, where the Lord Mayor and feveral Magistrates were in attendance on some city business. He was attended by Mr. Hamilton Rowan and several other respectable gen-

On being admitted, he was delivered into the custody of Alderman Carleton, who handed him over to Alderman James, who handed him over to the Lord Mayor. Mr. Tandy required his discharge, and that his examinations might be taken against the man who had arrested him, which was resused, and he was told, after fome deliberation, that he was in custody .- After fome further deliberation, however, the Magistrates present were unanimous that Mr. Tandy bould not be confidered as in custody, but at perfect liberty to go where it might please him. They declined, however, taking his examinations; on which he proceeded to Alderman Moncruffe's, who received his examinations, and bound him over to profecute at the next quarter fellions,
