The league, concerted on the Continent a-

that the best concerted plans, when not found-  
ed on the principles of virtue and justice, are  
soon defeated by the arbiter of human affairs.

Within these few days a person in Park Lane

up all to two or three scraps, which will be  
sufficient to certify the reality of the note, so  
that he will not be a sufferer by this uncom-  
mon accident.

D U B L I N, April 16.

This day, about two o'clock in the after-  
noon, Mr. Tandy, who was at his son's door  
in Chancery-lane, just stepping with Mr. Bad-  
ham Thornhill into his carriage, was arrested  
on the late proclamation by a man, who shewed  
him the Gazette, and required him to follow  
him. Mr. Tandy obeyed, and was, in conse-  
quence, conducted to the Exhibition-House  
in William street, where the Lord Mayor and  
several Magistrates were in attendance on some  
city business. He was attended by Mr. Hamil-  
ton Rowan and several other respectable gen-  
tlemen.

On being admitted, he was delivered into  
the custody of Alderman Carleton, who hand-  
ed him over to Alderman James, who handed  
him over to the Lord Mayor. Mr. Tandy re-  
quired his discharge, and that his examinations  
might be taken against the man who had ar-  
rested him, which was refused, and he was  
told, after some deliberation, that he was in  
custody.—After some further deliberation,  
however, the Magistrates present were unani-  
mous that Mr. Tandy should not be considered as  
in custody, but at perfect liberty to go where it  
might please him. They declined, however,  
taking his examinations; on which he proceed-  
ed to Alderman Moncrieff's, who received his  
examinations, and bound him over to prosecute  
at the next quarter sessions.

Yesterday evening a large party of the fol-  
diery belonging to one of the regiments in gar-  
rison, with side arms, kicked up a riot in Queen-  
street, and cut and battered a number of peo-  
ple in that quarter; they were, however, op-  
posed by many people of the neighbourhood,  
and at first worsted; but a reinforcement arri-  
ving from the Barrack, fully accoutred, they  
renewed their attack, headed by some of their  
officers; Smithfield, the Quays, Thomas-street,  
James's-street, Bridgefoot-street, &c. &c. was  
a scene of tumult and bloodshed. Several shots  
were fired, some into houses, and the bayonet

four of the ring leaders (including two of the  
people who held the possession) were appre-  
hended, and delivered over to the Magistrates  
and Constables of the district, in order to be  
sent to the county gaol. Thus a decided con-  
quest has been obtained by the Corps over the  
opposers of the laws of the land, in one of the  
wildest and most lawless districts in this part.

It gives us much pleasure to announce, that  
in the execution of this important business, no  
individual was materially hurt.—The detach-  
ment returned to Lisburn on Thursday evening,  
having marched upwards of thirty-two miles,  
and arrived here yesterday morning.

Ennis, April 16. Last Friday our assizes  
ended on the Crown side, and on Saturday the  
Right Hon. Mr. Prime Serjeant passed sentence  
on the following convicts:—Daniel Callaghan,  
for horse-stealing, to be hanged on Saturday  
the 14th of July; Bryan Carrol, for felony to  
the value of 4s. 6d. to be transported for seven  
years; James Hinchy, and Michael Carmody,  
for manslaughter, to be burnt on the hand.
