Mr. Tandy criminate himself—and he con-
ceived that here as in every court of justice, no
man was bound to answer questions that might
tend to establish his own guilt.—If the citizen
at the bar therefore would take his advice he
would not answer the question proposed.

Attorney General said he conceived the Hon.
Member's objection to the question was ill found-
ed—If Mr. Tandy conceived the question
would tend to criminate himself he might object
to it—but it would remain for the House to de-
termine how they should act in consequence of
that refusal.

Speaker said he had thought it unnecessary to
inform Mr. Tandy that he was not bound to
answer questions that might tend to criminate
him—Had he thought any Hon. Member could
possibly have objected to the questions he had
proposed to Mr. Tandy, he should have called
on the House to direct him what questions he
should ask—He would now wait till the House
thus direct him.

Attorney General then moved, that the
Speaker should demand of Mr. Tandy "whe-
ther he had escaped out of custody."

This being agreed to unanimously, the Spea-
ker proposed the question to Mr. Tandy, who
replied—"that he was in custody, which he
considered to be illegal and unconstitutional."
The Speaker interrupting him, and requiring a
direct answer—Mr. Tandy said "he would an-
swer no interrogatories which he was not bound
to answer by the Law of the Land."

Attorney General rose and said, Mr. Tandy
had confessed that he had been taken into cus-
tody by an officer of the House—he refused to
answer whether he had escaped from that cus-
tody, the evidence of their officers however,
on a former day, had established the fact, he
therefore moved, "That James Napper Tandy
be committed to Newgate."

The motion was seconded by the Hon. Denis
Browne, who expatiated for some time on the
 enormity of Mr. Tandy's offence.—It passed
NEM. CON.

[Mr. Tandy was then taken by the Serjeant
at Arms from the bar, and proceeded with him
to Newgate, accompanied by a very numerous
assemblage of most respectable citizens, amid
the acclamations of the populace, who seemed
to consider his committal as a triumph to him-
self and them]

Londonderry, April 10. Since our last, ar-
rived in the River, the Ship General Washing-
ton, Captain Brown, after a passage of only
28 days, from New-York.—Also arrived the
Ship Ann and Susan, Captain Duplex, and the
Union, Captain M'Leod, both from New-York,
by whom we have received the following Intel-
ligence:

New-York, March 8. Yesterday arrived from
Cape May, R. L. Steel, Master of the Brig
Wilhelmina of Londonderry, who informs, that
on the 23d January, he sailed from New Lon-
don bound to Dublin; that in six hours after
leaving the land, the Brig sprung a leak, so
that they were obliged to keep both pumps
going, and stood to the westward for a port of
safety. In this situation they continued till the
28 h, when they came to anchor off Cape
May, and in four hours after the Brig sunk;
and the crew took to the boat, and in going
ashore on the two-mile beach, the boats stove
in the surf. The crew, however got on shore,
where they remained three days in this situation
before they could get into any house, or any
thing to cover them but wet sails. The people
were much frost-bitten, so that three of them
are supposed not able to survive. The Master
had been very ill, but is now recovering.
