Cork, April 23. Last Saturday our assizes ended, when the following persons received their respective sentences, viz.

in the County—Richard Purcell, assault, fined 4d.; William Cuttle and John White, do. 6d. each, and imprisoned a month each; Rick Sullivan, grand larceny, to be transported for seven years; Mary Daniel, ditto, to be burned in the hand, and imprisoned two months; Honora Fitzgerald, ditto, to be imprisoned three months; Timothy Shettery, indicted for murder, but guilty of man-slaughter, to be burned in the hand, and imprisoned three months; George Boyd, felony, to be transported for seven years; Daniel Gully, misdemeanour on White-Boy Act, to be pillored five years, imprisoned three years, and to give security of the peace for seven years, to be pillored the first Saturdays in May, June, and July; Daniel Murphy, murder of Denis Sullivan, to be hanged by the neck till dead, at the Cross of Shreelane, and to be afterwards executed, according to act of Parliament; Warren St. Leger, and Mary his wife, assault and rape, submitted, having made compensation to the prosecutors, fined 6d.; Thomas Fitzgerald, and his Guiry, conspiracy to rob Mr. Lawler's wife, to be transported for life; Darby Desmond, forgery, to be pillored three times, on the second Saturdays in May, June, and July, imprisoned three years, and give security for five years; James Collins, otherwise Lee, perjury the last election, to have his ears nailed to the oars three times, an hour each time, the third Saturdays in May, June, and July, to be imprisoned a year, and to give security for three years; Laurence Daly, pig-stealing, to be transported for seven years; Denis Kenny, forgery, to be pillored three times, the last Saturdays in May, June and July, to be imprisoned three years, and give security for three years.

Waterford, April 26. The brig Suir, Capt. George Greene, of this port, on her voyage to North Carolina, was struck by a vessel, eight leagues to the westward of Cape Clear, on Saturday night last, at half past ten o'clock, which carried away her bowsprit, cut-water, &c.—Captain Greene saw the foremast of the vessel that struck him come by the board, but cannot say what further damage happened to her, as it blew a violent storm, the sea ran excessively high, and the night was so dark, that the two vessels did not perceive each other until they were almost in contact. It appears, from the information of a seaman belonging to said vessel, who was dashed into the Suir, and was found clinging in her rigging, that she is the Leopard, of Biddeford, Captain William Bell, bound for St. John's, Newfoundland, and sailed from Cork the 18th instant; had on board two men, one woman, and a child, passengers. Captain Green saw her lights for a considerable time after the accident happened, and stood by her as long as he possibly could. The greatest apprehensions are entertained for the safety of the vessel and the people on board.
