The war declared in France threatens to convulse all Europe, as there is scarce a power in it not in some degree or other concerned, either immediately or by alliance. The Low Countries, as most vulnerable, are the first object, from the circumstances of their vicinity and disaffection, and the Austrian territories must undoubtedly suffer most by the events of war.
