**DUBLIN, MAY 3.**

We are informed that an association is forming in London for the purpose of forwarding a reformation in the British Parliament, in which several very eminent characters are taking the lead, and from whom much is expected.

Yesterday at the sale of the late Mr. Daly's Library, the first edition of Shakspeare, folio, 1623, was purchased by a gentleman of this city for 20 guineas; Gower's Confessio Amantis, 1483, printed by Caxton, 13 guineas and a half; and Chaucer's Book of Fame, also printed by Caxton, sold for eleven guineas.

Tuesday last, a smart race was had between two ponies at the Fifteen Acres, in the Park, belonging to Counsellor Gold, and Counsellor Keatinge. They ran a distance of about two miles, for a wager of 100 guineas; each gentleman rode his own pony. The contest while it lasted shewed sport. Counsellor Gold won the race.
