

On the 4th inst. a subscription was opened at Armagh, in order to make a donation to the National Assembly of France, to enable it to carry on the war against the King of Hungary and the allied army of absolute Princes.

If it should happen that the Crown of these realms be involved in a war with France, those who remit subscriptions to the French will be actually guilty of HIGH TREASON—that of *levying, or causing, or procuring war to be levied against the King.*

The French were never remarked for cowardice, hence we may conclude, that their veteran regiments fled by the dint of money, not the force of fear; and to palliate their infamy, they sacrificed their innocent commanders.—Rochambeau's letters are fraught with well-founded suspicions, and strongly insinuate that his misfortunes had their origin in Paris, this the world can easily give into, from what they know already of that Court.

A letter from a gentleman in France to a relative of Count Dillon in this city, received upwards of two months since, contains an explicit prophecy of the fate that has befallen him—Dillon was really an aristocrat in principle, and as such was suspected by the people—it was contrary to the advice of every one who wished well to his safety, that he remained in command after his brother officers of the Brigades had resigned—as it was foreseen that if any misfortune occurred, he would probably fall a sacrifice to the suspicions of a jealous people.

Cork, May 19 A Correspondent observes, that from the frequency of murders committed in and about this city of late, some little deviation in the usual mode of punishment should be adopted, in order to strike a greater terror, which may prevent the horrid practice. He thinks speedy trial with speedy and shocking execution should be adopted; and instead of dissection, gibbeting and impaling should be substituted.—Regard in these punishment should be had to the situation of the delinquents distinguishing between the public notorious offender, and the private, but more dangerous one. In this latter class he places servants—Except uncommon examples are made of this class of delinquents, the confidence of society is abolished, and no person will know whom to entrust with his life or property, if those who partake of his bounty, who are sheltered beneath his roof, and fed from his table, should be the first to rob and murder his family, and then suffered to escape, through mistaken lenity. Compromises with murderers should not prevent the severe though just execution of justice.

May 21] We are authorized to contradict a statement given lately in the papers, that a verdict had been obtained by Edward Haynes, against Thomas Vokes, as no verdict had been found; the Court recommending the decision to be left to the determination of two Merchants of Cork, by whom an award was given in favour of Mr. Haynes; but that award has been on Saturday last set aside by the Court of King's Bench, on the motion of Counsellor T.
