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Yesterday the 23d, 38th 41st, 55th, and 56th Regiments of Artillery, the 4th Regiment of Dragoon Guards, and the 14th Light Dragoons, with the Royal Regiment of Irish Artillery, were reviewed in the Phoenix-Park by his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant.

The exercise and appearance of the military realised the most sanguine expectation, which by the extraordinary number of spectators seemed to be entertained.

His Excellency, entertained the Park between eleven and twelve, and the review was over at a quarter past two.

We can assure the public, that the alarm excited by certain legal proceedings of Mr. Tandy, has been so serious, that an offer was sent to that gentleman by a certain Police Alderman of quashing all proceedings against him, provided he would shew the same indulgence to the elevated persons concerned in a late Proclamation. This request of Government, which shewed equal wisdom and sincerity, Mr. Tandy did not think proper to comply with.

BAR MEETING.

A numerous meeting of lawyers took place on Wednesday in the Chancery Chamber—their proposed object was, to consider the effect and propriety of certain regulations intended to be adopted by the Benchers for the government of the society.—While the best method of pursuing this enquiry was under discussion, some of the gentlemen present declared their opinions, that the whole of the intended plan was founded in usurpation; and that the regulations proposed, would have no other effect than to subject the professors of the law to the exercise of an authority and influence, which would make them the absolute slaves of a set of men, certainly not more liberal or learned than themselves.—This degradation was felt with that resentment, which accompanies learning and talents:—instead of taking the proposed rules into consideration, they instantly agreed to an adjournment until to-morrow at one o'clock, in the Old Exchequer Chamber, when the total rejection of the whole system both in the principle and detail will be proposed, and it is expected as certainly carried.

DIED. Last Tuesday, in an advanced age, deservedly lamented, Mr. John Cox, of Clarefield, in the west of the Co. Clare.

Cork, May 26. Although the town has been left, through some unaccountable mistake, without any regiment, for three days and three nights, yet the most perfect peace has been preserved by the Magistrates, and the Boyne Society, who have done military duty.

Letters from our Correspondent at Gibraltar, say, that the garrison is in good health, but that owing to the troubled state of Morocco, torn to pieces by civil wars, fresh provisions are very scarce and dear;—they further add, that there is no sort of communication between that fortress and the Spaniards.

The 58th regiment, which is to be garrisoned in this city, came in this morning from Youghal.

This day part of the 28th regiment came in from Limerick, to do duty in this city.

On Thursday evening, Capt. Campbell, of Bandon, got a fall from his horse on the road leading from Cork to Bandon, and was killed on the spot.
