

Advices from Brussels are full of the dreadful apprehensions which prevail in that distracted capital of Brabant, as well as in every Austrian city of the Duchy, since martial law has been authoritatively established in that once free country. The Archduchess herself, they add, is so fully impressed with the terrors of the smothered rebellion, that Austrian tyranny has generated among the Brabanters, that she is preparing to abandon the seat of government, and remove to the interior parts of the empire.

On Saturday last, about half past three o'clock in the afternoon, a party of the Goldsmiths Corps, attended by a civil officer (on the information of an eye-witness,) apprehended a rascal in Plunket-street, charged with the murder of a man of the same business, in Cope-street, in consequence of which a proclamation had been issued. Too much praise cannot be given to Captain O'Brien, and the gentlemen who attended, for their spirited and proper conduct on this occasion.

Cork, June 2. This morning about 1 o'clock, three villains got into Mr. Lawton's house, in Hanover-street, by a back window—they were discovered by the servant maid, who gave the alarm, but they effected their escape, taking nothing however, out of the house: the Mayor being informed of this, came speedily to the neighbourhood, and had the most rigorous search and pursuit made after these robbers, but to no purpose.

Last Tuesday night a poor washer woman, who lived up the Dyke, was robbed by her daughter, in company with one Wm. Hughes, a soldier, and discharged from the Provost Martial, of a very large quantity of linen, &c. Several families in Cork have lost their entire wearing and house linen, some individuals have lost 15 shirts, others 9, two dozen, &c.

An Irish Priest of the name of Stafford, and native of Macromp, was lately Curate in a parish near Toulouse, where he fell a victim, we hear, to his over-zeal for aristocracy—he had the temerity to preach against the Constitution and National Assembly, which irritated his hearers to such a degree, that they put him instantly to death.

Died. Yesterday evening, in the 18th year of her age, in consequence of a rapid consumption, Miss Jane Jameson, daughter of Mr. William Jameson William, Merchant.

Happy would it be for Ireland, if all her nobility were inclined to follow so bright an example, and circulate among their tenantry, those sums at present so lavishly expended in distant countries.

DIED: Last Sunday morning, at his seat at Castle-park, in the north liberties of this city, Charles Smith, Esq; a gentleman of strict honor and probity, and of a truly amiable disposition; though qualified to shine at the Bar, he reduced his mind to enjoy the comforts of a private station: here he exercised the virtues of an universal philanthropy: he clothed the naked, he fed the poor, and found employ for the industrious—He was a most affectionate husband, a tender parent, a steady friend, and an indulgent master—Society must feel the loss of so rare a character, who, as he inherited all these amiable virtues, died universally beloved, lamented, and most by them who knew him best.
