

prudence to multiply the patrols in the environs, and make them strong."

It appears to me that this letter is a prudent one, and conceived in terms the most cautious. That I had a right to address it to the Commandant General: that I had a right to engage this officer to employ his forces, and multiply the patrols; this cannot be called in doubt. But in respect to this, a very remarkable error is inserted in the King's letter. By the Constitution, the King is Supreme Chief of the Administration, can give orders to the Department, who transmit those orders to the Municipalities. This is the order of Administration downwards; but all the functions which are essentially vested in the Municipal powers as the police, the Municipality exercises immediately and without receiving orders, the Departments oversee them, and the King reigns over all; this is the order of Administration upwards. It certainly therefore is not exact to say, that I ought to take orders from the King, because then it would be he who regulated the police of Paris. The King would then become the Commandant of the National Guards, which the law has not placed in his hands.

I think then that my letter was in itself prudent, and that I had a right; I will say more, I was under an obligation to write it.

This letter ought to have been known to none but the Commander and myself. I am willing to believe that there was in this nothing more than indiscretion on the part of the Commander, or of the person to whom he confided my letter; but the intriguer, who remitted it to the King, and who has sought it to give it a publicity, has manifested very bad intentions; that for instance of creating the belief that the King was not free. This is well-known to be the favourite system, and constantly followed up by a class of men who are implacable enemies of our Revolution and Constitution. The King said, the rumour which has been spread of his departure, is a horrible calumny. But who is it that has given weight to this report? Those who have published a confidential letter.

However, as the letter is now before the public, I desire it may be judged with severity. Every impartial man must see that, if even the King himself had been to take precautions for the public tranquillity, and for the safety of his person, he could have thought of no better. Had he wished to resist a factious party that attempted to take him away from the nation, he would have commanded force and guard.—Had he been willing to prevent the evil-minded from crowding into the Palace, he would have commanded force and guard.—What have I required? force and guard.—What have I done? I have kept watch while my fellow-citizens were asleep. (Signed) PETHION.
