The London Gazette, though lately convicted in two glaring instances of a mean partiality respecting the operations of the war in the Low Countries, still continues to be a faithful copy of that long reprobated print, the Brussels Gazette. Until the beginning of the present month, the British Ministers, had at least the decency to depreciate the affairs of France in the hired news-papers, but now they come forward openly, and unequivocally lay their sentiments, or rather their wishes, before the public. Unluckily for them, stubborn facts constantly step in, and drawing aside their flimsy disguises, shew to the world their contemptible manoeuvres; thus, ere the papers were dry from the press that represented the kingdom of France in a state of unexampled confusion, anarchy and outrage, the Quarter Sessions at Paris finish the trial of all the Calendar, in which there appears to be only thirty-three prisoners, being the whole of the culprits accused during this session of any breach of the criminal law; and of them but two either capitally arraigned or convicted, the rest being only for larcenies and small offences. It is worthy of remark, that there was no murderer, house-breaker, or street-robber in the Calendar, the two capital convicts being forgers of assignats;—equally unfortunate were those wretched scribes in their picture of French finance, from the 20th of May, to 20th June; for Lloyd's List in that time gives us a rise of 25 per cent. in the exchange, in favour of Paris, and a publication of equal authenticity, the London Custom House entries, by which we find, during the period above mentioned, that the influx of gold and silver into France from England was so great, that the house of Bourdieu and Co. of London, alone, have, from the 21st May, to the 19th June, exported from London to the city of Calais, in France, the enormous sum of thirteen thousand one hundred and sixty ounces of gold, and six hundred and fifty-five thousand two hundred ounces of silver; making, in Irish money, upwards of two hundred and fifty thousand pounds.

Tuesday arrived from England, the Right Hon. Mr. Conolly, and his amiable consort, in perfect health—and yesterday they set off for Castletown—to the heartfelt satisfaction of the surrounding poor.

The Providence of Yarmouth, William Debenham, master, arrived here yesterday from Grenada, with a cargo of rum, sugar, and cotton wool.—She brings an account that the crops of sugar and rum have been exceedingly abundant this season, and that the orders for sugars were more considerable than has been known for these several years past.

The Nancy of London, John Lake, master, arrived here from Lisbon on Monday last.— Letters received by her mention, that there are but very little hopes entertained of the recovery of the Queen of Portugal.

The Camilla, of Philadelphia, Samuel Williams, master, arrived here yesterday from thence, with a cargo of American rum.—This is the first vessel that ever brought into a British or Irish port rum distilled in America, and, we are informed, American rum is to be admitted to entry on paying the same duties as rum imported from the British West India Islands.
