

Extract of a Letter from the Hague, July 24.

"There has been some discussion between the Courts of Vienna and Hague, for some time, respecting the renewal of the Treaty of Barriers. It is not known how far the negotiation has proceeded, but it is certain that the affair is on the carpet, and that it will be concluded either upon the old footing, or by introducing some new regulations.

"It is not believed at Ratisbonne, that it will be easy to prevail upon the Diet to declare the present war, a *war of the Germanic Empire*; at least, it is added, that it will be opposed by the Electors of Saxony and Hanover in the Electoral College.

"The Austrian troops are encamped between Manheim and Spire, and it is generally supposed will cross the Rhine before the 1st Sept. to commence their operations against France."

It was yesterday reported, with a degree of confidence, that a note of a very extraordinary nature had been delivered on Thursday last, to his Majesty's principal Secretaries of State from the American Charge des Affaires.

The last Gazette was the longest we ever read about—*nothing*.

Colonel Cradock and Major Freemantle who set off last Sunday on a Continental Tour, intend to view the combined armies at Coblenz.

Lord Kingsborough arrived in town on Saturday.

Monday evening, sailed the Lady Fitzgibbon packet, for Parkgate, with upwards of forty passengers on board, among whom were, the Countess of Meath, and suite—Cols. Craddock and Freemantle, Mr. Gladow and Lady, &c.

Cork, Aug. 1. A letter from London, received by Mr. Alexander, our High Constable, dated the 25th inst. mentions, that Jeremiah Geany, who had fled from this for the murder of Mr. Edward Russell, of Black pool, was apprehended there by Cornelius Sweeny, Peace-Officer of this city, who was sent for that purpose to London, by Mr. Alexander.

Her cries were heard by a young man on the Quay, who immediately went to the spot, but before he arrived she disappeared, and was seen no more; her body has not yet been found.
