

attend this Congress, as it is presumed he will not be, the troops of the coalesced Powers will immediately enter the kingdom to oppose the enemies to the general peace of Europe.

Upon a fair and accurate calculation it appears, that 17 out of 20 parts of the whole commerce from Europe to Asia is at present enjoyed by Great Britain, and that the balance is still increasing in favour of this nation.

English newspapers are now admitted into Spain; and from the avidity with which they are sought, promise a speedy improvement to the literary amusements and knowledge of that country. For the general prohibition which hitherto attended all foreign periodical publications there, rendered the state of the arts, as well as all other refinements of polished society neglected, and almost unknown.

With all their boasted liberality of sentiment, the French continue to reason on the old system respecting other countries: they know that if England had been at any time distressed, they would have been the most forward to have taken an advantage of her situation, had they the power. England has now the power to retaliate upon them, and they cannot believe that she will not: hence the late suggestion which alarmed the National Assembly respecting our armament, as directed towards their eastern possessions.—They forget that England was a nation of freedom for ages, while they were willing slaves, and that the conquests she obtained at all times were the consequence of immediate provocation, and not the result of lurking malice.

Captain Kimber, in the African Trade, who was tried lately at the Old Bailey, for his life, and acquitted, has instituted an action against Mr. Wilberforce.

A gentleman is said to have lately left a great fortune to his son, with the provision that he never keeps a *running* horse.—An old sportsman did the same thing some years ago in Suffolk, and his *bit a blood* of an heir kept within the letter of his father's will, till he had lost his whole patrimony in *trotting* matches.
