

The Earl and Countess of ... will set off, in a few days from Clifden, for the family seat in Ireland.

Yesterday afternoon the arrival of the Raymond from Bombay, off Weymouth, was announced at the India House.

Yesterday Captain Mackintosh, of the Hindostan, took leave of the Court of Directors previous to his departure for China with Lord Macartney.

By the death of Lieut. General Philipson, the Minister has the third regiment of dragoon guards to give away. Lord Harrington is mentioned as the most likely person to get it; and Lord Cathcart to be promoted in the 29th, of which he is now Lieutenant Colonel.

Extract of a Letter from New-York, July 5.

"A compleat overthrow has lately been given to a numerous body of Indians, commanded by one of their greatest Warriors, who was left dead in the field, amongst many hundreds of his followers.

"The attack was commenced on the morning of the 28th of June, by a company of Regulars, under the command of Lieutenant Morton, of New York, aided by a number of the neighbouring inhabitants; and after a contest of three hours, put them totally to the rout. The carnage was general amongst the Indians, and no quarter given, as it might operate as a terror in future to savage freebooters, whose depredations on the property of every description of individuals, and oftentimes attended with personal cruelty to those in their power, had exasperated the Communities to the highest pitch of vengeance and retaliation when an opportunity offered."

Extract of a Letter from Portsmouth, Aug. 13.

"Yesterday arrived at Spithead the Pearl frigate, Captain Courteney, last from Gibraltar. This ship brought home from the merchants at Malaga 100,000 dollars, which were landed at the Custom-house this morning.

"The Henrietta fell in with off St. Vincent's, the 3d inst. ten or twelve sail of French men of war, steering to the W. S. W. and from their size, Capt. Johnson supposed them to be ships of the line. Wind W.

#### DUBLIN, AUGUST 20.

Since Monday last a great part of the Earl of Meath's Liberty has been kept in a dreadful state of alarm, by riotous mobs, consisting, it is said, principally of broad-cloth weavers, parading through the streets, preceded by martial music, and levying contributions for the support of their Association, as they call it. Those illegal and outrageous proceedings commenced on the night of the day above-mentioned, by an armed multitude assembling in Gibbon's Field, near Mill-street, where they tore down a lodge belonging to Mr. Harvey Fairbrother, and carried away a part of the roof.

The 31st Regiment (Young Buffs) under the Command of Colonel Cotton, arrived at Newry from Scotland the 9th inst. They are a fine body of young men.

Waterford, August 21. A few days ago a smuggling vessel of great force and wonderful velocity, supposed to be the Morgan Rattle was met off Cape Clear, by a revenue boat from Beerhaven.—The smuggler fired several shots at the boat, and killed one of her men.

In the City Court, thony Doherty, John Gallagher, Patrick Clark, and Laurence Shiel, for a burglary in the dwelling-house of the Rev. Mr. Palmer, Clonmackee, in the north liberties of Limerick, to be hanged on Monday the 1st day of October next.—John Ryan, James Cavanagh, Cornelius Hynes, and Timothy Hynes, burned on the left hands, and to be imprisoned six months.—Daniel Mara and Edmond Fitzgerald, for stealing a pig, to be transported for seven years.—And Mary Bourke, for felony in the house of Mr. Jonathan Downham, to be publicly whipped this day, which was accordingly put into execution, and imprisoned one month.

In passing the sentence of Death on Monday last, by the Hon. Justice Hewitt, on the five unfortunate Culprits, the humanity and tender feelings of the amiable Judge was remarkable; he pointed out to them the certainty of the awful fate which awaited them, in consequence of their being convicted by a respectable Jury, of a Crime, which of all others, called for the execution of rigid justice, and earnestly entreated them to make a proper use of the time allowed them, for appearing before their offended Creator; here his Lordship burst into a flood of tears, and was obliged instantly to adjourn the Court for an hour.

We think it would be sporting with the feelings of the five unfortunate malefactors now under sentence of Death, to buoy them up with hopes of a respite, for notwithstanding the unusual length of time given before their execution takes place, yet on the authority of the upright Judge who sentenced them, we are assured that no application will be made for the mitigation of said sentence.

Last Monday a dispute arose at Donags between Michael M'Mahon, Samuel Cashwell, and Henry Cashwell, (brothers,) in consequence of the two latter locking up a horse belonging to the former, for committing trespass, when M'Mahon received a blow of a large stick from Samuel Cashwell, which fractured his skull, and of which fracture he died same evening;—the two Cashwells were yesterday transmitted to Ennis gaol, by Hercules Browning, Esq.

The 13th inst. was married, at St. George's church, London, the Right Hon. Lord Carbery, to Miss Watson, daughter and sole heiress to the late Admiral Watson.—The young Lady was given in marriage by the Duke of Clarence; immediately after the ceremony was performed, they set off for his Lordship's seat at Laxton.—The Dutchess of Cumberland attended on the above occasion.

On Tuesday last, the Rev. Deane Hoare, by the payment of 3l. 10s. released John Dunn, (a city debtor,) who had been confined from the 19th day of April last, for the sum of 10l. 10s. 6d.

JOHN WALLER, Esq; HIGH SHERIFF, in the

RESOLVED, That we have read with Surprise and Concern, a printed Paper EDWARD BYRNE, purporting to be a Circular written and published by the Direction and Authority of a number of Persons of the Popish Religion, filling themselves the Sub-Committee of the Catholics of Ireland, which Paper we have the best reason to believe has been circulated with great Industry and through every Parish in every County in this Kingdom.

This Paper recommends to the Catholics to elect after the manner of the French National Assembly a Popish Congress to represent the Kingdom of Ireland, which Congress it is proposed shall meet and hold Sessions in the Capital, shall unite in itself the Catholic Power and Influence of this Kingdom, and act in the name and on the Behalf of the Catholics of Ireland and shall in effect Govern and direct them in the pursuit of such claims as they shall think fit from time to time to advance for and least a Spirit of Moderation and Forbearance of the Persons who may be elected Members of the Congress, might counteract or impede the Views and Designs of the Men who have presumed to call the Catholics of this Country to erect this new and illegitimate self created Power in the State: It is proposed that the Members who compose it shall be removed from the Pleasure and shall actually be removed, if they shall venture to set the Dictates of private or "private opinion" in opposition to the general and the public Good, "to make room for other more practicable." And the Catholics of Ireland are explicit Terms by the said Edward Byrne and the Sub-Committee, that a Popish Congress thus constituted, must succeed in carrying for them such claims they may think fit to advance.

We are therefore of opinion, that whatever Pretexes may be held out by the said Edward Byrne, the said Sub-Committee, for electing such a Congress it is evidently intended by them to overawe the sense of this Country, if they can, and to force the repeal of the existing Laws which have been enacted for the security of the Protestant Establishment in this Kingdom, and therefore we are of opinion, that if the said Edward Byrne, and the said Sub-Committee, are suffered to lead the Catholic Subjects of Ireland, and to procure them to erect a Popish Democracy for their Government and Direction in the pursuit of whatever Object may be held out to them by turbulent and seditious Persons, such a Proceeding must inevitably endanger the stability of our present happy Establishment in Church and State.

RESOLVED therefore, That with the best Views of our Fellow Subjects of the Catholic Religion, and the fullest confidence in their peaceable and loyal Dispositions, We feel it to be our Duty to caution against any such illegal and unconstitutional Assembly as has been recommended to them by the said Edward Byrne and the said Sub-Committee, a Measure which must lead to a renewal of those religious Animosities which so long and so unhappily disturbed this Kingdom, and which so far from contributing in any manner to forward their Interests must necessarily diminish the Confidence which the Legislature has heretofore reposed in their professions of Loyalty and Attachment to the Established Government.

RESOLVED, That it be an Instruction to our Representatives in Parliament, if any such Popish Congress that which has been recommended by the said Edward Byrne and the said Sub-Committee shall be called, that they do oppose any Proposition which may be made in the House of Commons for a repeal of the Popery Laws, and at all Events they do oppose any Proposition which may be made for to Catholics the right of Voting for Representatives in Parliament, a Franchise which in the present State of this Country, we are decidedly of opinion, extended to them with safety to the Protestant Establishments of Ireland in Church and State.

RESOLVED, That these Resolutions be signed by the High Sheriff, and printed in the Public Paper.
