**L I M E R I C K .**

Thomas O'Grady, Esq; Clerk of the Permits, is promoted to be Land-Waiter of this port, in the room of the late Arthur Adams, Esq; and George Rofslewin, Esq; is appointed Clerk of the Permits, vice Thomas O'Grady, Esq.

Last Sunday a man was drowned while swimming at the Pool; and same day, a fine Boy fell into the Canal at the first Lock, and tho' shortly after taken up, he unfortunately perished.

The poor boy who was unfortunately drowned last Sunday was not more than three or four minutes under water; several gentlemen of the faculty humanely gave every assistance in their power, but in vain, as they were totally destitute of those means and instruments necessary for the recovery of drowned persons. It is very much to be regretted, that a Society, on the plan of the Humane Society of London, and other large cities, is not established in this city, by which many valuable lives would in all probability be preserved.

Monday seven companies of the 64th regiment marched hence for Waterford, &c.—the remaining three companies remain here to do duty until the arrival of another regiment;—the eighteen soldiers who were tried at the late General Court-martial were escorted prisoners with the above division.

Monday evening the Assizes for this County and City ended, and on Tuesday morning the Judges set out for Tralee.—The following persons received sentence:

*In the County Court.*—Patrick Ahern, John Ahern, and Thomas Ahern, convicted of manslaughter, each burned on the hand, and to be imprisoned for one month.—Patrick Quilligan, convicted of stealing wearing apparel in the coach-house of John Waller, Esq; to be twice publicly whipped through the city of Limerick, on Saturdays the 25th instant, and 29th September next, and to be imprisoned for a month.

*In the City Court.*—Abraham Clarke, Anthony Doherty, John Gallagher, Patrick Clark, and Laurence Shiels, for a burglary in the dwelling-house of the Rev. Mr. Palmer, at Clonmacken, in the north liberties of Limerick, to be hanged on Monday the 1st day of October next.—John Ryan, James Caswagh, Cornelius Hynes, and Timothy Hynes, burned on the left hands, and to be imprisoned six months.—Daniel Mara and Edmond Fitzgerald, for stealing a pig, to be transported for seven years.—And Mary Bourke, for felony in the house of Mr. Jonathan Downham, to be publicly whipped this day, which was accordingly put into execution, and imprisoned one month.

In passing the sentence of Death on Monday last, by the Hon. Justice Hewitt, on the five unfortunate Culprits, the humanity and tender feelings of the amiable Judge was remarkable; he pointed out to them the certainty of the awful fate which awaited them, in consequence of their being convicted by a respectable Jury, of a Crime, which of all others, called for the execution of rigid justice, and earnestly entreated them to make a proper use of the time allowed them, for appearing before their offended Creator; here his Lordship burst into a flood of tears, and was obliged instantly to adjourn the Court for an hour.

We think it would be sporting with the feelings of the five unfortunate malefactors now under sentence of Death, to buoy them up with hopes of a respite for notwithstanding

*At a Meeting of the Freeholders of the County of Limerick, convened at the County Court-House, by Public Notice from the High Sheriff, pursuant to the above Requisition,*

**JOHN WALLER, Esq; HIGH SHERIFF,** in the Chair.

**RESOLVED,** That we have read with equal Surprise and Concern, a printed Paper, signed EDWARD BYRNE, purporting to be a Circular Letter, written and published by the Direction and under the Authority of a number of Persons of the Popish Religion, styling themselves the Sub-Committee of the Catholics of Ireland, which Paper we have the best reason to believe has been circulated with great Industry and Secrecy through every Parish in every County in this Kingdom.

This Paper recommends to the Catholics of Ireland to elect after the manner of the French National Assembly a Popish Congress to represent them, which Congress it is proposed shall meet and hold regular Sessions in the Capital, shall unite in itself the whole Catholic Power and Influence of this Kingdom, shall speak and act in the name and on the Behalf of all the Catholics of Ireland and shall in effect Govern and Direct them in the pursuit of such claims as this Congress shall think fit from time to time to advance for them; and least a Spirit of Moderation and Forbearance in any of the Persons who may be elected Members of this Congress, might counteract or impede the Views and Design of the Men who have presumed to call upon the Catholics of this Country to erect this novel and alarming self created Power in the State: It is proposed, that the Members who compose it shall be removable at Pleasure and shall actually be removed, If at any time they shall venture to set the Dictates of private Interest or "private opinion" in opposition to the general Will and the public Good, "to make room for others more practicable."
