

Our dispatches from Paris make no mention of Metz, Verdun, Sarre-Louis, Bitche, Thionville, or Montmedi, being captured by the Duke of Brunswick: the rumour may be considered as altogether unfounded.

It is said that Earl Gower, since his arrival in England, has declared, that if the Duke of Brunswick does make his way to Paris, he must wade first through an ocean of blood.

Yesterday Captain Robert Hudson was sworn in Commander of the Houghton East Indiaman, as was James Ludovick Grant, of the London.

The Duke of Brunswick's army is said to be much straitened for provisions. This is the natural consequence of bringing such an immense body of troops to bear upon one point.

General Jary who had a considerable command under Luckner, and whose zeal in the cause of the French was so ardent that it burned the suburbs of Courtray, has gone over to the Austrians.

DUBLIN, September 10.

It were well that the French had no fortified towns on the frontiers, as in that case they could bring their whole force into the field to oppose their enemies; beside, the strong towns in the French Netherlands, being taken by the Germans, will serve as places of retreat, and secure to them the possession of the fertile provinces to which they belong; this will, in all probability, be the conquest of the combined forces; for to reduce the interior parts of that extensive and populous kingdom, and subjugate the inhabitants to the yoke of former slavery, is beyond the powers of all the Tyrants in Europe.

On her passage she spoke, Aug. 11, the ship Albion, of Bristol, Capt. Wittenburgh, from Halifax to Jamaica, with four companies of the 16th regiment, commanded by the Hon. Major Rawdon, lat. 34, long. 58½.

His Lordship was the first Earl of Westmeath of the Protestant Religion, having conformed in 1775, and the same year took his seat in Parliament; he is succeeded in title and estate, by his only son, George Frederick Lord Delvin, representative in Parliament for the Borough of Forde, now Earl of Westmeath, who is married and has issue.—On the 29th ult.
