C O U N T R Y N E W S.

Cork, Sept. 10. Yesterday evening, a boy about seven years of age, was detected by the Bridewell-Keeper, attempting to convey to Flynn, (the approver against Rourk, Geany, and Shea,) a bottle containing some whiskey, which he said was sent by Flynn's wife.—The Bridewell-Keeper kept the bottle reproving the boy for bringing spirits to any person in the prison, but from the foulness of the liquor in the bottle, suspecting it may be mixed with something noxious, he gave it to Sheriff Dorman. On its being analysed it was found to be a mixture of arsenic and spirit.—One Thomas Rourke, brother to the above named Rourk, and who was servant to Mr. Aickenhead, the Apothecary, has been apprehended by Mr. Dorman and committed to Bridewell.

Kilkenny, September 11. Yesterday morning the Lady of General Medows set out from Sion, near this city, on her way to London, where the General's arrival is very soon expected.

On the 30th of August, Arthur Charles Battle, Esq; of Toome Castle, county Antrim, Inspector General of Stamps, &c. &c. was arraigned for the alledged murder of Peter Doyle, blacksmith; after a full investigation of the transaction, and several witnesses being examined, he was most honourably acquitted by a very respectable Jury, without quitting the box. The business appeared so much in favour of Mr. Battle, that although he did not think it necessary to produce any witness, he was instantly discharged by the order of Court.

Ennis, Sept. 13. Yesterday evening arrived here from Galway, the Hon. Mr. Justice Boyd, and the Hon. Mr. Solicitor General Toler, Lords Justices of Assize for the Connaught Circuit, and this morning opened their respective Commissions and proceeded on business.

Last Monday, Mr. Bolton, Surveyor of Excise, assisted by Mr. Dowling, seized at a house in Mill-street, a quantity of Snuff, together with the Mill, &c. used in the manufacture of that article, which they lodged in the Custom-house Stores.

The Governour, Deputy Governour, and Directors of the Apothecaries-Hall, Dublin, have appointed Mr. Richard Murray, of Rathkeal, in the county of Limerick, Apothecary, &c. their Agent and Inspector, according a late Act of Parliament, for the more effectually preserving the health of his Majesty's subjects throughout the kingdom of Ireland.
