**THIS DAY ARRIVED ONE PACKET,**  
(Via Waterford.)  
**LONDON, October 1.**

Intelligence was confidently said to have been received yesterday, by a foreign mail, that the Duke of Brunswick had reached Rheims unmolested, which is only about sixty miles from Paris; and, on Thursday last, he made the following speech to his army:

"Soldiers—A King and Royal Family are in captivity, daily exposed to the poignards of assassins: this moment all France calls for vengeance; honour has armed us for his and their defence; humanity makes it our duty; the eyes of all Europe are upon us; we must attempt to save them, or perish. Let us march!"

Other accounts mention, that the King of Prussia had given notice, that if the King and Royal Family were not immediately set at liberty, and a moderate government formed, that he would march one hundred thousand men, who had nothing to oppose him, into Paris, and lay it in ashes. The answer from the National Convention is said to have been, "that he must withdraw his troops before they would treat with him."—The consequence most probably is, that the combined armies are by this time in the gallic metropolis.

In the national Convention on Tuesday last, a letter from M. Montesquieu, was communicated by M. Brillon, announcing his very successful entrance into Piedmont.

The letter says, that the Piedmontese had just finished the construction of three redoubts, which commanded the whole defile by which the French troops could enter their territory.—They were on the point of furnishing them with cannons; therefore General Montesquieu thought there was not a moment to be lost.—In consequence, he gave orders to his army to be ready to march on the night of the 22d.—Unfortunately, a very heavy rain prevented the army from arriving at the destined place before day, which accident gave the enemy time to retreat. However, the principal object, the three redoubts, were taken, on which the principal system of defence depended. The Marches of Bellgrade, Apremon, and Notre Dame de Louis, are also abandoned.
