the support of tyranny in Europe could induce
the Despot of Prussia to sacrifice his subjects,
exhaust his treasury, ravage the lands of a
people, wishing only to cultivate peace with
the world, and meliorate their religious and
political state.

The Prussian and Austrian armies are already
Brunswicked, and they have good luck, indeed,
if they are not *Burgined*, before they cross
the Rhine.

The invasion of France, by the Spaniards,
will be followed with events that no man can
at present calculate—but it is certain that the
war will become naval, and that the West
India Island, as well as the Continent of South
America, will experience a terrible shock from
the goddess Liberty.

When the affairs of mankind are in greatest
agitation, the heads of the fertile are then sure
to be at work. Every little incident furnishes
them with some new invention, and each passing
day teems with a fresh tale. Among the fic-
tions of this sort, may be reckoned the report
yesterday of the King of Sardinia's being assas-
sinated. There appears no sort of ground for
it, neither in the advices received from abroad,
nor in the place his Majesty holds in the affec-
tion of his Subjects.

The Hessian troops in France have behaved
with much more propriety, and evinced infi-
nitely more respect for private property, than
either the Austrians or Prussians.

Baron Nolcken has been very suddenly re-
called from his Embassy at this Court, without
any reason being assigned for doing so. The
Baron was a great favourite of the late King
of Sweden, and this perhaps may account for
his being disliked by the Regent.

From the accounts brought by the latest
ships arrived from India, two or three weeks
ago, it appears that the inquiries made for as-
certaining the fate of the *Foulis* have proved
fruitless. The ship has not been heard of upon
any Coast, and appears to have been lost in
the open Sea. In what particular manner the
ship has so perished at Sea, can only be matter
of conjecture.

The most probable opinion is, that the ship
had, by the violence of the storm, been de-
rived of her rudder.

The loss of her rudder is one of the most
fatal accidents that can befall a ship at Sea.—
The ship thus becomes fixed to that spot where
the accident happened, there to founder at last,
without making any way in any direction, or
being able to steer for any place of safety.

The *Aurora* frigate, which, several years
ago, was carrying Mr. Vansittart and other
superintendants to India, has never been heard of
to this day.—The *Swallow* packet was lost
about the year 1778.—The *Cato*, a King's 50
gun ship, was lost in like manner.

The *Foulis* is therefore the fourth ship, to or
from India, of which no news has been re-
ceived, which we remember at present.

This day the King had a Drawing Room at
St. James's.—The Queen was not present, her
Majesty being indisposed.

Prince Augustus is perfectly recovered from
his late dangerous indisposition.

The determination of the French Assembly
to victual their army in the Netherlands and
Germany, partly with Irish provisions, will, no
doubt, have a good effect on the export of bar-
relled beef in this kingdom, which for some
years has been a considerable article of trade.

A report is in circulation, which seems to
be founded on good authority, that Govern-
ment has given orders for quartering two regi-
ments of Infantry in this City, four in Cork,
and eight in Dublin.

On Wednesday last, Captain Lysaght, son
to William Lysaght, of Mount-North, in the
County of Cork, Esq; on his return home from
Mr. Crofts, was thrown from his horse at the
Cross of Woodfort, near Mallow, and unfor-
tunately killed on the spot.
