

The reception of the Royal Family last night at Covent-Garden Theatre shows that the spirit of the people is unanimously loyal. Long may it continue so. It is justified by the conduct of those to whom the homage of duty is now paid; and their successors give hopes that they will copy the bright example, which alone in these times, when the factious and the ignorant are so busy, can secure to them that love and dignity which they will be entitled to by hereditary claim.

Two circumstances contribute much to the progress of the French in Germany; the vast number of Frenchmen in that country ever since the revolution of the Edict of Nantes; the descendants of French families, whatever countries they inhabit, still remain Frenchmen in language, manners, and affections. At Berlin only, we know on the best authority, that there are not fewer than 30,000 French. Another circumstance favourable to Revolution principles is the custom of the Germans, even those who have houses and families, of dining at the Table-d'Hote. The men, therefore, are almost universally formed into dining clubs; and when pot-valiant are all friends to liberty.

By the Convention of Reichenbach, signed the 19th of October 1790, Great-Britain, Prussia and Holland guarantee to the House of Austria the sovereignty of the Belgic provinces. Should the French invade Brabant, is England to become a party in repelling the invasion? The answer is, that England stands guarantee under certain conditions; two of which are, that the franchises of the Belgians, granted by the *entree joyeuse*, should be re-established and maintained, and that an amnesty should be granted to the Belgic insurgents. Have either of these conditions been observed? Report says, No, no.

Parliament, we are assured, will not assemble in this present year 1792.

We had lately a most tremendous account announced from authority, of daggers ordered by a gentleman at Birmingham; the sum and substance of which turned out to be that three manufactures signed an agreement not to execute an order for daggers under a certain price and that one of them having sent notice to government of the order, was told in answer, that he or any body might manufacture as many such daggers as he pleased.

DUBLIN, October 29.

On Saturday last, Patrick Malone was executed at the front of the New Prison, for robbery. Through the mismanagement of the executioner, in not securing one end of the rope inside the gaol, the unhappy man, after being launched from the board, was precipitated to the ground, and remained so long motionless as to be supposed killed by the fall.—A scene of confusion followed this affecting accident, the military in attendance having presented their muskets in order to intimidate the multitude from any attempts they might eventually make in favour of the prostrate malefactor; this circumstance spreading the utmost terror and disorder, great numbers were trodden under the feet of those hastening from the apprehended danger, and many were severely hurt.

The miserable sufferer being taken into the prison, soon recovered, not having received any very considerable injury by the fall, which was broken by a quantity of rubbish and dirt near the jail.—An hour elapsed before he was again prepared for execution, and during this interval, we are informed, an ineffectual an-
