

Of those delegates that have hitherto been returned to the Catholic meeting, there is not one who has not by landed or personal property a very considerable stake in the country—they are also men eminent among their people—men whose situation in life renders it impossible for them to be concealed, should they venture upon any measures not perfectly consistent with the spirit of the constitution, and the safety and peace of the country.

There is another and a valuable pledge for the peaceable and moderate conduct of this representative body. That their proceedings will be watched with a jealous eye there can be no doubt—if therefore they should venture on an act not justifiable by the strict letter as well as the spirit of the constitution, it may be expected that they will individually answer for their temerity.—Nothing therefore can be more absurd than the fears relative to this assembly which have been so industriously and we will say maliciously circulated.

From the reports in propagation, which many weak and credulous people are led to believe, we should imagine, that there are secret agents employed to agitate the minds of the public, and make them imagine that in a few months, troubles and disturbances would break out in this kingdom. But whoever seriously takes into consideration the general disposition and tried loyalty of the subjects of every religious denomination and political opinion, must be fully convinced of the frivolity and fallacy of such idle suppositions and alarms.

The military establishment of this country is happily only in aid of the Civil Government; as such the soldier is, in the strictest sense of the word, a Citizen. The man, or print, therefore, that is base enough to vilify the army, ought to be punished with the utmost severity of the laws as an enemy to their country.

Monday at the Commission of Oyer and Terminer, in consequence of the former adjournment, Lord Clonmel, Mr. Justice Boyd, and Mr. Caldbeck, one of his Majesty's counsel, took their seats in the Court of King's Bench, to hear counsel on a motion to arrest judgment in the cause of the King against the Walshes, father and son, convicted of embezzling letters and bills put into the Post Office.

Mr. Browne and Mr. Mac Nally spoke in favour of the prisoners, and quoted a variety of cases to shew that the commissioners of Oyer and Terminer had not, by the present commission under which they sat, jurisdiction to try any offence made felony by statute, since the issuing of the commission, which was so long back as 1729. Mr. Mac Nally also argued at great length that the commission of Jail Delivery, as it depended on the commission of Oyer and Terminer, was also void.

The Attorney General, Solicitor General, and Mr. Frankland supported the jurisdiction of the Court: M. Attorney went at large into the question with very great ability.

Lord Clonmel declared he would not then give any opinion. He said he had consulted his brethren, and that they were unanimously of opinion that the point should be reserved for the opinion of the twelve judges.

The prisoners were then remanded to jail till the next commission.
