Last Sunday evening a considerable seizure of Leaf Tobacco, was lodged in his Majesty's stores in this City,—which was made near Newport, in the Co. Tipperary, by Messrs. A. C. Stritch, Surveyor of Excise, and Messrs. M'Daniel and Walsh, Revenue Officers.

The Incendiaries who privately conveyed hand-bills into several houses in this City, in order to intimidate the Citizens to illuminate their houses on Monday night last, on account of the Combined Armies evacuating France,—were grievously disappointed.—The Loyal Inhabitants of Limerick spurned the mandate, which had for its object the disturbance of public tranquility; not a house therefore in the City or Suburbs put up lights; this may serve as a lesson to the agitators of Sedition, that notwithstanding many respectable persons here, are pleased with France having nearly completed a revolution in that lately despotic kingdom, they are convinced that any Revolution in these happy Isles would be the greatest scourge that the Almighty in his wrath might inflict on a free People.

Monday evening Mr. W. Fitz—d, and Mr. John Hart—y, jun. fought a duel with pistols, in a field outside Thomoad-gate;—after an exchange of shots in which neither were wounded, the seconds interfered and made up the disagreement.

On Sunday night last, Died, at his house in Bank-Place, John O'Brien, Esq; merchant, a Gentleman, who, from the most amiable manners was respected and beloved by a numerous acquaintance.—He, in a particular manner, evinced the very great advantages that are derived to natural abilities, from a liberal education.—He died in the prime of life, and has left a most amiable Wife to lament the loss of the most endearing Partner of conjugal felicity.—His remains were yesterday taken for interment in the family vault near Corofin, Co. of Clare, attended by an numerous train of Friends and Fellow-Citizens on horse back and carriages, as we recollect on any similar melancholy event in this city.
