LONDON, November 5 & 6.

The Sceptre and Crown of France is already sent to the Mint. The Imperial Crown of Charlemagne will shortly follow, as all the Regalia of the Emperor's Coronation, valued at several millions, have been taken at Frankfurt.

Many people are of opinion, that if the French invade Brabant, Great Britain will be obliged to declare war against them, in consequence of the last treaty, by which it guaranteed the possession of the country to the House of Austria.

Whenever Government shall think proper officially to receive an Envoy of the French Republic, the Democrats here have insolently declared, that Tom Paine will be the man!

M. Bourgois, the French Minister, still continues to be received at the Court of Madrid.

The King of Sardinia, having made pressing solicitations to the Government at Milan for aid against the French, 10,000 Austrians that were encamped at Pavia have been ordered to march for Piedmont.

The project of M. Truguet is generally believed to be an attack on the Pope's territories; and, if so, there is nothing to prevent its complete success. Civita Vecchia is precisely forty miles from Rome. The road is perfectly open, and five hundred men in arms could not be collected, either to oppose their landing, or to impede their march. They expect to find, in the plunder of Rome, or in the contribution to be exacted from the Sacred College, an ample recompense for the *Holy Crusade* which it has excited against France, and which it has blessed.

There is a rumour in Paris that Luchefini is to be appointed by the Court of Berlin, to negotiate with the French Republic a treaty of alliance, and to concert the plan of mutual operations against the House of Austria.

The Commissioners of the several dock-yards should be particularly careful in this mischievous moment, whom they permit to examine their respective trusts, especially foreigners, however long resident in this country.

Yesterday a Board of Admiralty was held at the Office, Charing Cross, when the Charon of 44 guns was put into commission, and the command given to Captain Edmond Dodd.

Previous to the departure of the Duchess of Cumberland from Margate, she had an alarming accident. In stepping to her carriage, the foot of her grace slipped, and she fell under the carriage; the horses took fright, but the Duchess escaped with a few slight contusions.

The French National Convention have passed the following Decrees:—

I.—Whoever by advertisements, newspapers, writings, or discourses, either pronounced or hawked about, shall counsel or provoke the People to murder or assassination, shall be punished with twelve years' imprisonment, provided the crime has been perpetrated, and to death if the crime be followed by the

either. One was, that a body of ten thousand Marsellois had gone up the Adriatic with the determination of making a descent upon Loretto. The other was, that a Squadron had left Marseilles with the intention of making good a landing at Civita Vecchia, and afterwards to proceed against Rome itself.

The Pope has promised 2000 scudi towards driving the French troops out of Savoy.

Genoa has declared itself neutral.

The King of Naples will regulate his conduct according to that of Spain.

At Brussels, it was reported, that the Prussians and Russians, under the command of the King of Prussia, had reached Coblenz.

By letters from Honduras we learn, that a general insurrection had broke out in the Spanish Settlements in that quarter; and that disturbances in Hispaniola prevented assistance being derived from that part.

By other accounts, we are informed, that the Americans and French were aiding the Mexicans to throw off the Spanish yoke.

The Royal Retrenchment, now the subject of so much conversation, is not only to extend to the model of living, but will have laudable reference to personal connexions.

We have little to apprehend from the Marine of France—the most of their ships have been suffered during the political tempests of their country, to rot in their harbours. The French are now endeavouring to put their navy into repair, with a view, no doubt to be able to cope with *Great Britain*, who must not expect to be exempted from the general attack which France meditates against all Empires and States.

The progress of the French, so much the reverse of all previous calculation, seems to have thrown all Europe into a stupor of amazement. The French, however, will at length undo themselves by their successes; for they are so intoxicated by them, as to lose sight of all justice and moderation.

DUBLIN, NOVEMBER 8.

The London Gazette of the 3d Instant, contains very long Dispatches from Lord Cornwallis, but as they were brought by the Manxman, who had a tedious passage, they are no way interesting.—His Lordship has appointed such Person as he thought eligible to preside as Governors over the newly acquired Country either ceded to him, or conquered from Tippoo Saib, until the pleasure of the Company should be known.—The two Sons of Tippoo yet remain as hostages, and every attention is paid to them by the British Generals.—We are happy to find that the greatest cordiality continue to subsist between the Commander in Chief and the other Officers and troops.—His Lordship adds, that measures are taking for the reduction of the native and British troops to the peace establishment.

The Lord Chancellor, notwithstanding his recent indisposition, sat yesterday in the Court of Chancery.

Yesterday the Law business commenced.

In the Court of King's Bench, Mr. Gaff was arraigned for firing at, and wounding a revenue officer. A jury was impannelled from the county of Limerick, where the offence was alleged to have been committed—but no prosecutor appearing on the part of the Crown, the prisoner was discharged.

Shallow politicians who can penetrate no farther than the surface of things, simply imagine, that conquest must attend every frantic undertaking of the ragged forces of France—the next spring will probably cause them to entertain a different opinion, when, if the reports of foreign newspapers be true, an army of 400,000 men will be combined against them.
