

## IRISH STATE LOTTERY, 1792.

Monday the Drawing of the State Lottery commenced at the Theatre in Capel-street.

### First Day's Drawing.

Last week several attempts were made by the journeymen weavers in the Earl of Meath's Liberties, with a view to destroy an industrious manufacturer, who had the spirit to prosecute, a few days previous, four of these persons called Light-horsemen, for breaking into his house and carrying off some of his property, because he refused to give them money which they demanded to support their combinations. For this purpose, they hung up his effigy on the maypole in the Weavers-square on Saturday, which was to be thrown into his house at night. The master manufacturers having given notice of this infamous scheme to Ben. Houghton, Esq; he attended with a party of the military, and having cut to pieces three of those maypoles, lodged them in the Coombe barrack. In the course of last year several industrious working people have been stripped naked at those poles, and punished, by whipping, for not complying with the regulations which the journeymen combinators have thought proper to frame.

Cork, November 10. On Thursday's melancholy accident happened at Cove: A woman went for water to a spring, under a cliff near the town, and while filling her vessel, a large piece of the rock fell down, broke one of her thighs, knocked her head against the edge of the pail and cut it in a most shocking manner.—She was big with child, and is not expected to recover.

Extract of a letter from Youghal, Nov 6.

"Yesterday being the anniversary of the Gunpowder Plot, was observed here with every demonstration of joy. The morning was ushered in by the ringing of bells, and the firing of cannon. The Mayor, Corporation, and principal inhabitants, attended by the regalia, walked in procession to St. Mary's church, to hear divine service, where a most excellent sermon, suitable to the day, was preached by the Rev. Mr. Higgins, Chaplain to the Youghal Independent Blues—at two o'clock the Volunteer Corps turned out on the Mall, and fired three volleys in honour of the day, which was answered by the shipping in the river; at night the town blazed with bonfires, and was most brilliantly illuminated, and a variety of fireworks played off on the Quay, which had a most pleasing effect. The Corporation and Volunteer Corps were honoured with the presence of the Earl of Shannon and Lord Boyle, at Studdy's hotel, where an elegant supper was prepared, and many loyal and constitutional toasts drank, and the night concluded with the greatest harmony and good humour."
