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Shame upon you—incendiaries! how little ought you to be credited.
It is not generally known perhaps, that the French are indebted to that generous magnanimity which has ever marked the Council of Britain, for not having to contend against a feeble force which might have been mischievous, though it would not be conformable; and which, though confined to frigates and privateers, might have annoyed and done considerable injury to the commerce of France in the four quarters of the world. The spirit of enterprize, on the first appearance of hostile ties between the French and Austrians, already anticipated immense fortunes from a predatory war; and English vessels belonging to British subjects, were already at Ostend to receive Imperial commissions when government took the necessary measures to stop their being issued by representing to the Court of Vienna, in strong terms, the part it would be compelled to take in case its remonstrances was not attended to. In consequence of this spirited conduct, a maritime war was renounced as impracticable, and all hope given up of drawing Great Britain into a confederacy by indirect means, which she had formally and publicly declined.

Letters of Marque were of course refused to the many applications made for them at Brussels, and the adventurers returned to Ostend and to England, no less disappointed than those who would have employed them, and thought to have seen the Austrian ports filled with British seamen and French prizes.
The Principality of Piedmont, which the French are now invading, is the richest and best cultivated in Italy, and only divided from France by the river Var. From that territory the English alone import from two to three hundred thousand pounds worth of raw organized silks annually, and our merchants obtain what is used of that kind of silk, as indeed of all others, collaterally from England, which must ever operate against the extension of such manufactures in Ireland, particularly as we are obliged to send ready money for the articles, which are obtained in barter for British cloths, &c. by the merchants of England. In no other part of Europe would our linen cloth, tanned hides, &c. be sooner bought up, and yet, the trade of this country to Italy is scarcely deserving the appellation of a commercial intercourse.

Richard Burke, Esq; son of the Right Hon. Edmund Burke, arrived in town from Limerick on Tuesday last.
The trial in the great cause so long depending between the Right Hon. James Lord Baron Sherborne, of Sherborne, in the kingdom of Great Britain, and William Naper, of Littleton, in the county of Westmeath, Esq; come on at bar in the Court of King's Bench on Wednesday next.

The herring fishery proves very successful on our coasts, particularly from Tuskard, in the county of Wexford, to the Rosses, in Donegal, in which above one thousand vessels are employed. The take is often so great, that herrings have been sold from the boats at a penny per dozen to hawkers, who carry immense quantities in kishes to the internal parts of the country, where they retail them at four and five a penny, which, though rather cheap in comparison of the Dublin prices, yields a profit of between fifty and sixty per cent.

In many parts of the West of England, a severe epidemic, under the form of Scarletine Agriola, has for some time past prevailed in so great a degree, that of many villagers, particularly Holdsworth, nine-tenths of the inhabitants have been confined at the same time.

The complaint originated in the very frequent and heavy rains that have almost deluged the country.

We are happy to learn that few cases have terminated fatally.
