Counsellor, to a Proclamation which ordered

on the subject of corn; it was more numerously
attended than it has been for many years. We
understand that the evidence laid before their
Lordships was not sufficient to warrant a Pro-
clamation to prohibit the export of corn—the
export will of course continue to be regulated
by the wise provisions of the existing laws, and
it is to be hoped that the Magistrates and Col-
lectors of the different Districts and Ports of the
Kingdom, will be particularly attentive to the
performance of their duty upon this subject
during the present season.

We are authorized to assure our readers,

We learn from Brussels, that Capt. Thomas

and Spanish service, is at this time Lieutenant
Colonel and Commandant of the second batte-
lion of the grenadiers of France, under Gen.
Dumourier.—He was at the battle of Jemappes,
near Mons, where, and at several other impor-
tant actions, he has maintained the military
character of his country.

We are concerned to hear, that the failure
of a certain merchant-brewer, has caused a
disagreeable concussion on Change, which even
amounted to an hesitation to take the best
paper. Dublin at this day, rising as it is, to
commercial eminence, is not as yet prepared
for such events.

The export of butter continues, at the rate
of from three to five thousand casks and firkins
a week. The principal demand is from Bour-
deaux, Nantes, and Rochelle, from whence
the rest of France is supplied with what can
be spared from the West India Islands. There
is little reason to suppose that our merchants
will forbear so gainful a trade for the sake of
their country, as the current price of Irish
butter in the ports of France is from twelve to
sixteen pence; at Lisbon and Oporto from six-
teen to twenty; at Gibraltar, Cadix, Malaga,
Valencia, and Barcelona, from two shillings
to half a crown; other places more remote in
proportion.
